State Meeting Minutes for January 11, 2014 Synopsis by Darlene Jolly

The meeting was called to order at 9:01am by President Kathy Chase. Corresponding secretary reports the Bylaw changes all were approved. Bylaws are updated and will be sent out electronically. Treasurer reports a balance of \$128,048.18.

Education & Leadership Seminar has 26 registered and nine RV's registered so far.

2014 Festival at Enumclaw has 141 registrations to date. Trails In dance will be called by Adam Christman. The grand march will not be done by Councils this year. RV's are first come, first serve. Please mark your registration form to let them know if you need handicap site. No dogs except service dogs allowed inside the fence. (You must prove they are service dogs).

2015 festival in Everett will feature callers Joe Saltell and Dee Dee Dougherty-Lottie. Trail in on Thursday will be called by Steve Noseck & Kevin Thomaier.

2016 festival in Longview is all on track.

2017 festival in Spokane will be the third weekend of June at the Fairgrounds. Mike Seastrom calling and TJ & Bruce Chadd doing rounds.

Heritage Center reminds us that with any donated items be sure the form is attached so they know where it came from and what it is. Forms are on the state web site.

Historian as always needs newspaper articles, flyers & pictures for state books.

The youth scholarship applications are available on the state web site.

New information on license plate fees is on the state web site.

61st National Corporation has now been dissolved. They turned the final \$33,455.22 over to the State Federation.

Bylaw committee needs one final clean up meeting so should be final at May meetina.

From delegate reports we learned of the passing of Cuer Jill Spiese of Peninsula Council.

Next state meeting is at Milton-Freewater, OR on May 16-17, 2014.

Old Business: Tabled motion was brought back on the floor that the NEC representative be made a standing committee of the Federation. The motion failed. President Kathy then appointed the NEC representative Don and Chervl Pruitt as a Special committee. This means they will get per diem but will not get a vote.

New Business: Legion Squares, a MS club from Rainier Council, and Frolickers travel club of Spokane Council were accepted into the Federation.

Motion passed to increase the youth scholarship from \$500.00 to \$750.00 starting this year.

Motion made to have Frank Chase look for pricing for amplifier and digital recorder for use by the State Federation at any state functions. Currently we have only mikes and a speaker. Three bids are required.

Motion passed to accept the Grant Committee guidelines and the form as a special committee.

Motion passed to purchase new Festival sign sandwich boards at a cost of \$96.80 per sign. We need 20 of them for a total cost of \$2,094.75 including tax. The signs are 20 x 36 in size and are light weight.

Discussion on the two books missing from the Heritage Center and current availability to the Heritage Center. It will be worked out so there is availability at all times.

Callers and their contracts

Marie and I hope you had a very special holiday season and were blessed with many wonderful moments.

This month I wanted to discuss a very important vehicle in our business, **The Contract.** Contracts can be many things but generally they are documents that clearly define what is expected between two parties.

A. Often times the "contract" is simply an agreement between two callers and or cuers. "You will be coming through my area and I've asked you to call or cue my dance. "In this case I rarely worry about contracts because I know and trust this person, and most often it is a pickup dance on the way to another venue.

B. If you are hired by a local club, you should have a contract with them. This device spells out what is expected of all parties. In my opinion this is the basics of what should be included in the contract. (As always this is only my opinion. As I am not an Attorney, if you have questions you should consult a professional.)

- C. Suggested Contract Specifics
 - a. The date(s) and level of dance(s) you are contracted to call.
 - b. The location and time of the dance. (This is your tax mileage record)

c. Who is responsible for equipment? (It could be the caller or the cuer, or in some cases the hall).

d. Remuneration (How much and what are the conditions of your pay?) (See the example below where I clearly did not understand the conditions that the club charged dancers).

e. A contact with mobile phone and email address

f. The club should ask for a copy of your current ASCAP BMI License. (This protects them).

g. A reminder email with any pertinent information 30 days before the dance (standard club dances who have contracted you for the season

may be exempt from this).

h. What are the cancellation conditions? (See the example below).

1. Cancellation clauses can vary. Typically my contract includes a 30 day notice. Either I or the club can cancel the contract or a single dance within 30 days of the dance. There may be conditions you want to include in this area.

D. One Night Stands should be treated the same way as noted above.

E. Special Dance contracts are different. If you are contracted to call a festival, or special dance there are some conditions you want to be clear on.

a. Special Considerations:

i. In the case of a regional festival, the contract may state that you do not call or cue within a specific radius or perhaps in the State within 6 months either way of your contract. Should you do so, this can be considered grounds for termination of the contract. This is to ensure dancers will attend the festival you are scheduled to call or cue.

ii. Accommodations and or travel expenses may be offered as part of the contract. In situations when lodging or travel expenses are included you may consider asking for a basic travel and lodging allowance within the contract. In this way you can choose the airline and hotel of your preference.

iii. Will you be sharing the dance with another caller or cuer?

Examples:

Payment clauses

Years ago I was contracted to call a birthday ball in Seattle. At the time my contract read X number of dollars or 60% of the gate which ever was greater. This was a large club, so when on my first tip I saw nearly 30 squares on the floor, you can imagine I was expecting a good payday.

At the end of the dance the treasurer handed me a check for my minimum. I noted to him that this was short as there were 30 squares dancing. He explained that this club did not charge their members at the door their dance fees were paid for in their dues. As my contract stated 60% of the gate, they felt they met their obligation. I made a decision that night to change my basic contract. Since then I have modified my contract to my base minimum or X amount per person in attendance. In that way it doesn't concern me if the club chooses to make it a free dance. That is their choice.

Cancellation clauses

Recently I was scheduled to call some dances in another state. Because of inclement weather two of the dances were cancelled on very short notice. One was a pickup dance a caller friend setup for me, and the other was a

special dance negotiated between a cuer friend of mine and the club at which I was to call and she was to cue. Because of how these dances were arranged, I did not have a cancellation clause in either contract.

I am fortunate that both clubs decided to take the fact that I had already traveled to the area in consideration. One club paid the contracted amount the other contributed toward my expenses. This was generous in both cases as they really were not obligated to do anything.

The end result is that the conditions in your contracts should be spelled out clearly. In that way there are no misconceptions and each party is aware of their obligations.

- C. Demonstration


I have found that coming down off of the stage and working directly with the class is a benefit and seems to help them.

Remember, the above process has nothing to do with the individual renewal process that we will be mailing out in early March to each club treasurer. We will speak more on that in the next FOOTNOTES issue.





Read the book

The instruction book that came with the sewing machine or serger is a very important part of learning to use the machine to it's fullest capacity. If the book has been lost, you may be able to go on line and down load a copy. Also check eBay and other sources. The sewing machine dealer may be able to get instruction manuals from the factory. Read the manual - cover to cover. Most stitchers figure that they know how to sew, so they don't have to read the book. A new machine can do many things the old ones never thought of. How about sewing with twin needles? The threading instructions are in the manual. What is the widest size twin needles the machine will take? That's in the manual also. Read carefully

To make the manual easier to read take it to an office supply store and have a spiral binding put on. They can also add plastic covers to the front and back to protect it. While at the office supply store consider having them make copies of the most used pages and laminating them. This is very good for the serger manuals. Get color copies of the thread paths and stitch setting guides and have them laminated. They can sit on the table right next to the serger and if coffee is spilt on them they can be wiped off.

The manual will give the names of all the presser feet and attachments that came with the machine and may have pictures of optional presser feet for other techniques. Having the correct presser foot is like having the correct screw driver for the job. You could get it done without it, but the correct tool will make the job easier and better. The instruction book will give the stitch length, width and tension settings that different techniques require. Learn to use all of the accessories that came with the machine to get your money's worth.

If you are going to classes or sewing retreats be sure and pack the manual. There may be some technique or setting that is required for the class and a quick check of your manual will inform you how to adjust the machine for that project. Also keep all of the feet and attachments with the machine when you go to class. Classes and retreats are a fun way to meet new people who like to do what you like to do. Learn new skills and get inspired to do something you never thought of.

As long as we are talking about classes be sure and label all of your stuff. Grab those address labels, that you have way too many of, and stick them on all of the stuff you take to class. Often, after we teach a class, we find a foot control under the table when we vacuum. If you put an address sticker on the bottom of the foot control, we will know who to call. Wrap one around your power cord also. The hard cover for your machine looks just like everyone else's, so stick a label on the top of that. Get crazy and label your scissors, rotary cutter, rulers, and anything else you take to class.

If you can't get to a sewing class - read a book. There are many sewing and serging books out there and they are a great way to learn new techniques and ideas. I have over 200 books. Look for sewing books at the public library and if you find one you like purchase it for your book shelf. Also pick up books at secondhand stores. Sewing is an art form. There is always more than one way to do anything. Don't skip over a book just because it is old. The fashions may be dated but the sewing information never goes out of style.

You can also find lots of sewing and serging information on-line. There are short videos of many techniques. Some of them are bad, but there are a lot of very good and interesting ones. If you learn better by seeing it done, rather than reading about it, on-line may be the answer. There are even classes you can take on-line. My favorite fitting book "Fit for Real People" by Pati Palmer is available on a DVD, as are many other sewing instructions.

Go to my web site SquareDanceSewing.com. Click on the tab 'Articles'. Then click on 'Reading About Sewing'- for a list of my favorite sewing books. When you travel and can't sew, just take along a stack of sewing books. Make notes, draw pictures and design a new project.




