

A Tribute to Don Wiggins

With a gregarious, witty, humorous personality, Donald Lee "Don" Wiggins was a natural as a traditional American-style square dance

For decades he untiringly advocated for the pastime and never wearied of extending dance invitations to most everyone with whom he came in contact.

"Come take lessons," he'd offer with a smile on his face and a twinkle in his eve.

Don died at his Puyallup, Washington home on August 22nd.

Don had an entire fan club in those who attended square dances in Milton-Freewater during his time here. He and Pat moved to Walla Walla for his new post at the Walla Walla Union-bBulletin. They met when he was living in Southern California and married on March 13, 1976.

Don was an advertising representative who covered U-B accounts in Milton-Freewater.

At that time, he took up square dance calling and eventually formed his own club, the Milton-Freewater Muddy Frogs.

A teacher in Walla Walla, Pat shared his passion and was a round dance cuer. Their home in Walla Walla was built with huge closets to house Pat's skirts, dresses and fluffy petticoats, along with Don's matching shirts. The house also had a ground-level room big enough to hold dances and a special platform and booth for the music and caller.

In 2006 Don and Pat moved to Puyallup to be near family. They continued teaching and calling for various square dance clubs in the area and often traveled throughout the country attending square dance conventions.

A past president of the Washington State Square and Folk Dance Federation, Don was involved with the national square convention. He received the Almon F. Parker Inspirational Award for his outstanding job of teaching and promoting dancing as a wholesome recreation for participants of all ages.

Don served as editor of FOOTNOTES, the WSSFDF square dance magazine. On the federation website Don and Pat are cited for receiving The Bob McNutt Round Dance Cuer/Teacher Award for an outstanding job of teaching and promoting round dancing as a wholesome recreation for all ages.

As a young man Don served as an aerographers mate 2 aboard the USS Durant, an Edsell-class destroyer.

Don was an active member of Toastmasters, Rotary and Lions clubs and Chamber of Commerce in communities where he lived.

An avid golfer, Don enjoyed getting up in the wee hours to wander the golf courses with his golf buddies. "If he wasn't golfing he was watching it on TV."

"Don enjoyed golf in the way he enjoyed most things in life – he looked for the fun and didn't worry too much about the rough. He would laugh off a bad shot and didn't mind needling his opponent as he lined up an important putt," said fellow golfer and U-B colleague and Editor Rick Doyle.

"Don was always ready with a joke and he had a repertoire that ran from PG through X. He loved to entertain and would have been comfortable on the stage" (Rick Doyle)

Don was buried with Military Honors at Tahoma National Cemetery in Kent followed by a memorial Service at Shepherd of the Hill Presbyterian Church in Puyallup.

RULES AND REQUIREMENTS

As we progress into the new dance season, once again, we will remind everyone of the rules and requirements for members and NEW members.

The state dues for each member are \$1.50 and the insurance dues are \$4.50, making a total due of \$6.00 per member. By the time you read this, hopefully all the clubs will have completed their club renewals and their membership lists. Remember, the May 31st deadline we request from you for this information allows us the time to process it before the August 31st deadline.

For those clubs giving lessons, you need to send us a list of your students' names, addresses, and telephone numbers. You do NOT need to send money for the students as long as they are taking lessons. Students are covered by our insurance while they are going through lessons. Upon graduation, the student is covered for 10 more days. At that time, the student must join a club and pay the \$6.00. If they do not join a club within the 10 day period, they will no longer be covered after lessons. A new graduate joining your club would be handled the same as any person joining the club, send us their name, address, and telephone number along

As we progress into the new dance with the required \$6.00 per member.

A club adding new members during this dance year will need to send us the new person's name, address, and most importantly, their telephone number, along with a check for \$6.00 per member.

The Frolickers of the Spokane Council have re-joined the federation as a traveling club. Unfortunately, we lost two clubs this year: the Rockin' Teens of the Rainier Council and the North Olympic Callers and Cuers of the North Olympic Council.

Our next big project will be to audit all of the club's individual membership renewals. We are going through them cross referencing the list in the data base to make sure all folks have paid correctly. That is, to make sure members have paid in one club only, but in fact have paid in one club. We have a few discrepancies and will be notifying clubs of the minor problems. We currently have 3,075 dues paying square dancers in the state which is up 81 members at this point last year – Way to GO!!

At the September state meeting we handed out corrected club individual membership lists per your renewals to the council delegates. If you have not received these yet, you need to contact your council. Check them carefully and let us know if there are any further up-dates needed. An email copy of this membership list is available from us upon request.

Our insurance policy runs from September 1, 2014 through August 31, 2015. There is a generic Certificate of Insurance with the new in-effect dates on the Web site. As a reminder, if you need a specific certificate, the form to request this certificate is also on the Web site. Complete it and send it to us and we will get you whatever you need.

We need to emphasize that

incidents (accidents) connected with square dance activities need to be reported to us via the "Incident Report" available on the Web site and hopefully posted in your dance halls, no matter how insignificant it may seem at the time. This is extremely important due to the fact there are time restraints on the benefits available. Although an incident may seem insignificant at the time, complications may arise later and benefits could be denied due to the time restraints and the fact the incident was never reported.

Caller/Cuer Teamwork

It is hard to believe it is October already. Where did the year go? This year has brought many changes for Marie and me. Marie is cueing now, and has begun teaching. For me, Square Dance classes are in full bloom. This got me to thinking about the Caller/Cuer team and the relationship necessary to present a successful dance. I have been very privileged over the years to work with some of the State's finest cuers, including Denis Crapo, Debbie Taylor, Ron Woolcock and Randy Wulf to name just a few. I certainly could go on as we are very blessed to have great cuers in this State. While I am on the subject of excellent cuers, congratulations to Joyce Sebree for being this year's McNutt Award recipient. Joyce is another very talented Cuer I have been fortunate to work with.

Having and maintaining a good Caller/Cuer relationship is very important to having a successful dance, especially as it pertains to a local club. The Caller and Cuer are effectively a team. There are several things you, as the caller, can do with regard to working with the cuer to make the dance a great success. It starts off by understanding your responsibilities for sound. If you are guest calling and are responsible to provide the sound system, make sure you are at the location in plenty of time to set up for pre-rounds. In today's digital world, it may be prudent to contact the Cuer and find out if he or she are set up for digital as well. It is not good to show up to set sound for pre-rounds only then to find out the Cuer uses records, and you brought an amp without a turntable. When you are confronted with such a situation, it is perfectly fine to ask the cuer to bring their own turntable. A simple A-B switch will solve the problem.

In many cases, you may want to collaborate with regard to what rounds the Cuer has planned to present. This information can be helpful to both of you. If the dance is themed, you may want to balance the singing calls around the theme just as the Cuer may balance the rounds to the theme. Many rounds are current pop tunes, just as many singing calls are based on popular tunes of the day. Even if you are a very good singer, you may not want to compete with the pop artist who is singing the song the round dance has been written to. Examples of this are songs such as Lou-Mac Records recently recorded. Knee Deep, by Zac Brown, and I Don't Know What She Said, by Blaine Larson. Both are currently

popular rounds and now are out in a singing call as well. I tend to like to know what songs the cuer is planning so I don't duplicate them in a singing call during the evening. Also you may want to consider music tempo. If the cuer is going to do Fiddle Steppers Polka, during one tip, you may want to adjust your program so the singing call for the next tip is something a bit slower. Another thing to consider is space. Often times you are both working in a small area. It is only good manners to contain your tools, i.e. records, laptop, etc. to a space that allows both of you to work comfortably.

In short, keep in mind that you the Caller, and the Cuer are a team. As such, the more you collaborate and cooperate, the better the experience will be for the dancer. After all that is our goal. Fun For All And All For Fun.

Choreo Gems

A new aspect being used around the square dance world is a modification of "Balance" referred to as "Fancy Balance". Starting from a Right Hand Ocean Wave with Boys on the End and Girls in the Middle, ending in the same exact spot. Dancers step back allowing the girl to twirl under the right arm of the boy and stepping back to the same spot in the wave they started from.

Singing Call Figure

Heads Promenade Half Way, Walk In and Square Thru Four, Do Sa Do and Then Swing Thru Double, "Fancy Balance", All Eight Circulate, Swing and Promenade.

Teaching Hints

As lessons are just getting started I have found it to be a good aid to have the Club Photographer take pictures of the new students, to create a montage with names. I keep this as a reference on stage until I am familiar with the new dancers.

Teaching Jewel

Remember virtually all 2 and 4 person calls can be taught from a Sicilian Circle.

Paralyzing Perfectionism

An inability to start something for fear the results will be less than perfect.

Many women have come up to me and told me that they don't sew because they know that the project won't be perfect. They demand perfection in something that they create while they are standing there in a factory made garment that has several flaws in it. This attitude is debilitating and self-destroying. Life is tough enough without being your own harshest critic. Why be that mean and nasty to yourself?

Artist and crafters the world over have a tradition of adding a flaw to their project. This is to show that they are human and therefore not perfect. The Navajo leave a small hole in their rugs as a tribute to Spider Woman who taught them how to weave. The creation of cloth and its transformation into useful items is a tradition that goes back to the beginning of history. Fabric and sewing touch all parts of our lives.

Each garment or project is a learning curve. You will say to yourself, "I will never make that mistake again." That is because you are gong to make entirely different mistakes in the future. If a project doesn't come out

exactly as you planned - change the plan. I have never made a garment that was 'perfect'. I am a human being working with fabric and thread, something always goes 'wrong'. I have appliquéd a flower over a hole in a blouse and changed the color of a collar because I miss cut the original one. A top that came out too small was the perfect gift for a friend.

There are no mistakes - just creative opportunities.

Pick a project and just do it. Start with something easy to get your confidence up and when you complete that one go on to something more challenging. Enjoy the journey not just the destination. The feel of fabric and the hum of the machine should make you relaxed and comfortable. When you make something, even a pot holder, it is an accomplishment. You didn't learn to dance in one lesson; you can't learn to sew in one day.

Professional workers in a factory can set in a sleeve that looks perfect in a few seconds. That is because they set in more sleeves before lunch than you will do in a year. Mistakes are also made by professionals; inspectors at a factory will reject flawed stitching. That is where 'factory seconds' come from. If you know how to look, you will find many flaws in garments at even the finest stores.

You can't compare a unique creation with a mass produced T-shirt. When wearing something I have made, I know that no-one else has one like it. When shopping for a garment you have a limited selection of colors, fabrics, sizes and styles. Take it or leave it. I have control over every aspect of my garment. Many people think that they can buy a blouse for less than it costs me to make one. They are not looking at the whole picture. My custom made blouse will last longer, look better, be more comfortable and give me a feeling of accomplishment that can never be obtained from a store bought garment.

If you don't point out the mistakes in your creation most people won't see

them. Your friends are more interested in your company and enjoying the occasion than they are in your clothes. The type of busybodies who criticize other peoples sewing are not your friends. I have frequently told people that if you want to hide the flaws in your sewing it is very easy, all you have to do is dance faster.

On the next trip to the fabric store be sure to get a couple of brand new, nice sharp seam rippers. You know you are going to need them. Get rid of all of the old dull ones that are cluttering up your sewing stuff. Dull seam rippers will pull and break the threads instead of cutting them cleanly. I have three different styles of seam rippers, so I have the right tool to take out any stitching. The bobbin thread is usually easier to pull than the top thread. Increase your stitch length to 3.5 mm or 10 spi. Not only will the sewing go faster, but it will be easier to take out.

As ye sew, so shall ye rip!

Ed note: Your editors thought the following essay by Emily Kosterman was so special that we have separated it out from the regular CPSC club news. We invite you to enjoy this delightful insight to our hobby.

After being asked to write an article on square dancing and youth for **JACKS & JILLS**, I felt a little at a loss for subject matter. How many times can you say "we're kids, we have fun" or "we work hard for competition" before someone gets bored?

So, not wanting to rehash what's been said before, I thought I'd take you on a ride through the eyes of a new dancer, aged anywhere from nine to 18, and the impact a youth club has on them. It's bigger than you think.

The first thing this young person sees, whether they were dragged there by friends, brought by a dancing adult, or the rare variety that come out of curiosity, is how relaxed and easy the environment is. I can't tell you how many times people come in, see us having a ball, and get (eventually) swept up in the joy that surrounds teen square dancing. First impressions count immensely and you can almost see the hokey ideas they might have had, falling to pieces. I remember my first night and thinking, "Wow, they're all friends, they're all smiling, and they seem to be having a good time." For a youth or teen, nothing beats this.

The next thing the new dancer might notice is how everyone is dressed. Instead of traditional skirts and boots, they'll see us wearing whatever we'd normally wear. This is an icebreaker in itself. I'm sure some kids come thinking that it's all about barns and cowboys and stomping in the hay. Being comfortable frees them to engage and think, without dealing with feelings of embarrassment. That will come later, in lessons. Veteran dancers know what I'm talking about *wink, wink*

Now, the new dancer has seen a friendly environment, but they don't know anyone or anything. Music begins playing and the group shuffles towards the floor. Feeling off balance, they look around, unsure where to go. Then, out of the milling crowd someone comes up to them and says, "Hey! New kid! Come dance with me!" and then grabs their hand and hauls them to a square, whispering helpful tips and introducing them to the others.

With this kind of welcome, new dancers typically start cracking smiles and bouncing with the beat in just a few minutes, but then the real work starts and they realize that they have to -gasp - touch...other...people! (I can hear you laughing, but it's true! It made me so nervous my first few times, you wouldn't believe it.)

As uncomfortable as some people are with touching hands, it takes a surprisingly short amount of time for it to become second nature. Until then, the new dancer must take their cue from those around and discreetly wipe their hands on their pants when they encounter sweaty palms. Such is the sacrifice a square dancer makes.

Once the call starts, the next thing they will feel is utter confusion. I

remember thinking, "What did he just say? Was that English? Where am I going?!" But without fail, seven other sets of hands begin pointing, gesturing (and sometimes hauling) to guide the way for uncertain feet. For that first night, feelings of confusion, inadequacy, and sometimes frustration will vie with the comforting realization that no matter how bad they think they're doing, there are dozens of voices telling them "You can do it, just turn here, stop there, take my hand, you're doing great!" They are understandably confused by the lingo, but that is something only time will fix.

At the end of that first night, wrinkle lines may have worked their way onto the forehead of the young dancer, but there are an equal amount of smiles, placed there by the satisfaction of remembering a Do-Si-Do or an Allemande Left, and the upbeat, sometimes silly, but always welcoming environment created by kids their own age.

Whether they come back or not, they have been advertised to in the strongest way possible; experience. Nothing can replicate or beat the atmosphere created by teens who take their dancing both seriously and humorously. Not to impinge upon the friendliness of adult square dancers, but you don't often see them breaking down to modern beats in the middle of a call. That can make up a kid's mind in a hurry.

Add to this the element of Competition. Some kids come for the new friends they make and not all finish lessons, but by the time Competition practice rolls around, there are a few who will have grafted in so completely that they gladly choose to spend the next several months with us. The idea of pushing themselves, putting hours of sweat and laughter into learning Mainstream and Plus, memorizing round dances, practicing cues and calls, rehearsing crazy exhibition routines, and then going to PNTSDF to see what they can win, is appealing to them. The very nature of square dancing, the healthy, familial atmosphere (with a level of competitive excellence) is part of their bones.

That is why we do this. To bring kids into a friendly, challenging, and rewarding environment, show them they have talent, and watch them flourish. Growing the club is a side benefit. It is wonderful to see so many young people choose to put their time into such a constructive activity.

People who don't understand the benefits of square dance, the mental strength, confidence, and grace you learn, might tease them about it, saying its "uncool", but it is a skill no one can take away from them, one they can showcase and be proud of. The trophies are pretty amazing too.

Personally, square dancing has taught me many things: the power of community, persistence, good work ethic, and a positive attitude, all born of years spent with an amazing team, growing in confidence and ability, and never, never forgetting that at the heart of it all, square dancing is fun!!!



RAINIER COUNCIL (in conjunction with Peninsula and Central Puget Sound Councils) stepped way-outside its traditional comfort zone with a first-ever television ad blitz in September. The 30-second "spots" promoting the start of square dance classes in the Rainier Council area aired for three weeks on a number of cable networks (e.g. CNN, CMT, National Geographic, Animal Planet, TLC, ESPN2), with many of the spots airing during "early primetime" (4-7 pm), some on weekends, and even some "primetime" slots.

Promoting square dancing in print-media (i.e. here in Footnotes) continues to be an effective and relatively inexpensive way to promote our activity. In this "digital age", however, it's becoming increasingly important for the square dance community to reach out to prospective new dancers with a broad-based promotional strategy. The strategy should, at the very least, include social media like Facebook and Twitter. Accounts on these networks are "free" (and easy) to setup. Updates ("posts" and "tweets") can be quickly disseminated to the entire square dance community and beyond, almost in real-time. If your clubs or councils are not already taking advantage of these technologies, you're missing out on an untapped gold-mine of promotional opportunity.
