### 501(c)3 - What does it mean?

Happy Fall everyone. Can you believe it is November already? Where did this year go? Before we know it, the holidays will be here and over. The good thing – the square dance season is well underway, classes should be going well and everyone is dancing.

Guess what – we did it, the State Federation is once again a 501(c)3. But what does that mean you say? You know what? I have no clue! I am in no way knowledgeable about how this tax "thing" works. The only thing that I do know is that has to do with our non-profit standing with the government. I did go on the web and found out a bit. I hope this helps people understand out new status.

So, what are the differences between the two – Our old status, 501(c)3 and 501(c)4 you might ask? According to the Internal Revenue Service Code, 501(c) (3) and 501(c)(4) organizations are nonprofit organizations that are exempt from paying federal income tax. 501(c)(3) organizations are either a public charity, private foundation or private operating foundation with open membership, whereas 501(c)(4) organizations are civic leagues or associations operated exclusively for the promotion of social welfare or local associations of employees with limited membership.

In order to qualify for 501(c)(3) status, an entity must be organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, testing for public safety, literary, educational purposes, foster national or international amateur sports competition or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals.

501(c)(3) organizations are highly regulated entities. Strict rules apply to both the activities and the governance of these organizations. No part of the activities or the net earnings can unfairly benefit any director, officer, or any private individual, and no officer or private individual can share in the distribution of any of the corporate assets in the event the organization shuts down.

OK, I have confused everyone enough on this, including myself. I am sure there are some of you who have tax experience and can understand what this all means.

The number one reason we went through all the work to get reclassified was so that the Federation could receive the proceeds from the 61st National Convention that we all worked so hard on. I want to thanks Pete Murray who put so much time and effort into getting this change made and to Erin Harth who

was able to push the process along a bit faster. I don't know what you did Erin, but thanks!

With the funds we received from the 61st NSDC, we were able to give Footnotes, Leadership Seminar and the Youth Scholarship fund some much needed financial help. Without these entities of the Federation, where would we be? Plus we have put together a special committee to come up with ideas on how we can offer funds to the rest of the state. Be patient, it is all new to us and we want to make sure it is done right.

Well, enough for this month. I hope you all enjoy the fall dancing all over the state. Maybe next article, I will explain where my nick name "the Brat" came from.

# A FOOTNOTES Picture Primer

FOOTNOTES loves your photos. FOOTNOTES wants to help you document and immortalize in print the activities and antics of your club. We want your photos to look good in print. Unlike your cell phone, i pad or computer screen, the printing press needs much more digital information to make pictures look good. To do this we need your help. Here are a few ideas.

- 1.) We strongly recommend NOT using cell phone cameras for photos being submitted to FOOTNOTES.
- 2. Digital cameras are adjustable as to file size. Choose a "normal" or "better" setting. This will create a JPEG (.jpg) file that is somewhere around a megabyte (MB) in size. More is fine. Less is marginal.
- 3.) Attach your .jpg (JPEG) picture files to email, preferably as attachments rather than placing within text.
- 4.) Provide a brief description of each photo in your email including the club or council name, activity depicted, name of identifiable persons left to right and the name of the photographer. Lacking all of the above information, send as much as you can.
- 5.) Identify each photo description with the same filename that is on the picture. For example if you choose to use the number assigned by the camera, use that same number with your description. If you rename the original picture, use the rename with the description.
- 6.) Please do not crop pictures. Send FOOTNOTES the whole picture and let us crop for telling the best story.
- 7.) Please coordinate with your club and/or council reporter to let them know you wish to provide photos. That way they can include something about the event in the text.
- 8.) Photos may be sent to either Margaret, FOOTNOTES or to my personal email shown above. Everyone needs copies. It is important to send a copy to the entity not included in the main address line.

I have deliberately tried to keep these ideas simple. If there are those among our readers who would like a more technical explanation, just drop me an email. Good luck. Happy picture taking.

- Angels are role models, always providing good habits.
- Smile enthusiastically, be friendly, gentle, lend a helping hand, remember how you felt as a new dancer.
- Angels are NOT teachers, the function of an angel is to lead by example, be at the right place at the right time.
- It is better to use eye contact and / or point them in the right direction, then to use too much force.
- Be careful not to embarrass any dancer by the way you ask for help.
- Encourage the students; let them know we all make mistakes, and actually angels make mistakes too.
- Angels should refrain from doing the extra stuff until said caller teaches it.
- Square up with everyone, maybe choosing weaker students or partners that are struggling.
- Lend a hand... take a turn at whatever needs done (set up, clean up, refreshments, partner to dance).
- Just keep an eye out, spills out on the dance floor; they need to be wiped up.

- Always let the caller or cuer know if there is a problem on the dance floor.
- Don't complain about the hall, caller, or who is attending the class.
- Don't criticize.
- Remember your name badge.
- Lead by example, you are being watched more than you will ever know.

\*\*Thelma said she uses 9 inch round baking tins. The person who gave Thelma the recipe uses 8 inch round tins. So, one can use which ever size they have. Thelma only makes 3 layers even though the recipe says to divide the dough in to four parts. If there is left over dough, it can be used for a smaller layer on top of the torte or crumbled and sprinkled on top with the walnuts.

# **T**EACHING ORDER HELPS TO EASE NEW CLASS CHALLENGES FOR BOTH CALLER AND DANCERS

Classes are in full swing by now, an exciting time to be sure. Teaching is, in my opinion, a privilege and one of the most fun parts of being a Square Dance caller. Think about the excitement of the new dancers. They are learning a new language, meeting new friends and, if we are doing our job right, having a great time at it.

There are a lot of challenges we face with a new class. We need to set goals and find ways to meet each challenge as it arises. Not everyone learns the same way. Some people can learn from oral instruction, some need to actually read the definitions for themselves and still others learn best thru demonstration.

I believe callers should make it part of their teaching tool kit to come down off the stage to demonstrate a move with a square. When you do, a couple of good things happen. The new dancers will see a correct demonstration of the move, a picture, in this case a demonstration, is worth a thousand words. Also, the students will realize that you are approachable,

so when they have a question they won't be too shy to ask.

When they do ask a question, I have found it valuable to not only address it with the student who asked at the time, but to review the question and the conversation with the rest of the class from the stage. "Joe had a question about Swing Thru, why don't we all review it to see if there are any other questions". All too often others have similar questions but are too shy to ask.

One of the most valuable tools in our kit is a prepared and published lesson plan. When I went through SCUBA Certification we were taught to "Plan the Dive and Dive the Plan". You can use the same philosophy about teaching people to dance. "Plan the Teach, Teach the Plan". The plan needs to be followed, especially if you work with other callers in your area. Remember you depend on one another to make lessons and class level dances successful.

When new dancers go to a Class Level Dance they will remember the caller who kept them dancing by calling moves they knew as well as the one who was calling while they were standing and feeling panic because they did not know a moves being called. You have to ask yourself. Which caller do you want to be?

In the Olympia area, we have a plan that is reviewed and refined every year. Keep in mind that teaching order is a recommendation not a mandate. You can change the order to some degree to facilitate better teaching or learning. For example, in our Caller Association, we moved "Courtesy Turn" much further down the list than recommended by Callerlab. We placed it well behind Square Thru. A few years ago, we noticed that when teaching Square Thru, dancers wanted to do a Courtesy Turn on the Second Hand of the move. By moving Courtesy Turn after Square Thru, we eliminated the problem.

I am sure many of you are asking "what about all the calls early in the teaching order that use a Courtesy Turn". We addressed this by teaching Wheel Around and Flutter Wheel much earlier in the list, and we use them extensively. For example on 4 Ladies Chain, we will ask the girls to Star with the right hand and the Boys to take them out with a Wheel Around. A Reverse Flutter Wheel gives us the equivalent of a Two Ladies Chain. Of course, after we have taught Courtesy Turn, we go back to those moves such as Ladies Chain that includes a Courtesy Turn, and review with the proper definition.

This practice has served us well over the past few years. The operative word is US. We, the local area callers have agreed on this order. If your new students are going to a class level dance, to a caller who is not in your area, or not following your teaching order, it is helpful to send a copy of your teaching order along with an Angel or take one if you are attending. If possible communicate with the other caller in advance of the event. This will give the other caller an opportunity to adjust his or her program accordingly.

Another issue that should be addressed early on is tempo. Many new dancers attend their first Class Level Dance and find themselves very frustrated because they are not used to dancing to tempo. The nationally recognized tempo is 126 - 128 BPM.

Music and call tempo is often slowed down for new dancers. This is done while they are learning new moves. This is a solid time proven method for successful teaching. We should also remember to call review tips at or near Dance Tempo. By doing this the new dancer will be more accustomed to reacting faster to those moves that they have been dancing for a while.

### **Insurance Certificate Requests**

Feel free to print that to include in your club records and to provide proof of insurance to facilities that require them. Remember, some facilities ask to be a 'named insured' on our policy. This is no problem. If a facility asks to be a 'named insured' on our insurance policy, here is the procedure to follow to accomplish this: go to the state

website, under the M&I tab, and scroll down to:

# "GENERAL LIABILITY INSURANCE CERTIFICATE REQUEST FORM."

Click on that to bring up the form, fill it out on line, print it, and get it back to us via scanning it to email, or snail mail. We will then get you a certificate with the requesting facility being named on that certificate. This request form can be used for special events, regular club dances for the entire year, etc. Just be sure to include the explanation in the "Description of Event/Activity" box, and also be sure to include the requesting facility's information on the lower part of the form. If you have any questions, don't hesitate to give us a call.

Don't forget to send us a list of your students! Please remember, if a student should join multiple clubs, they need only pay the state dues and insurance of six dollars through one club. This would hold true for anyone belonging to multiple clubs, they need to pay their state membership and insurance through only one club.

# November 29th is National Square Dance Day!

This month I'm taking you back to the classroom for a little lesson/ reminder of square dance history!

Square dancing began in its most primitive form in England around the early 1600's and the first six person choreographed dances were performed by teams of all men! They wore bells while they danced for some extra fun, though I can't imagine what a floor of bells would sound like at a dance today! Many other European folk dances are thought to influence square dancing, but after the revolution in the U.S. colonists favored French style dances (down with anything British!). That would be where the moves "promenade", "allemande" and "dos-ados" (meaning back to back in French) came from.

As square dancing developed in the U.S. many regions and cultures added their influence. The Appalachian region began developing dances that relied more on callers than memorized moves, and are also thought to be responsible for developing the "caller persona" needed to carry the crowed, create a fun atmosphere, and get people to come back! African-Americans were often

callers, and also provided live music adding their cultural influences along the way!

When square dancing began to dwindle in the late 19th century, auto tycoon Henry Ford hired a dancer by the name of Benjamin Lovett to help develop a national program because he loved and believed in square dancing so much! The development of square dance standards, records, and microphones all aided in the spread of modern western square dancing as we know it today!

## Ease on down the road

Ease is the difference between the body measurement and the garment measurement. There are different types of ease in a garment. Wearing ease is the amount of extra fabric needed just to move. Wearing ease allows you to sit, bend and turn. Design ease is extra fabric for style. Big puffy sleeves are design ease. Negative ease is how swim suits are designed. They are smaller than the body, the type of fabric allows movement.

The amount of ease is a matter of personal preference. Some people like clothing to fit close to their body, very sleek and smooth. Others like looseness around their body and flowing styles. Neither version is wrong or right when when it comes to fit. Clothing, even when closely fitted, should skim the body and have at least minimum ease. Always keep in mind that you are going to be very active in dance clothing. You need to be able to bend and stretch.

Read the description in the pattern catalogue. The pattern company's description of fit is based on the bust measurement for blouses and dresses, and on the hip for skirts and pants. The finished garment measurements are often printed on the hip and bust area of

the pattern tissue, and on the back of the pattern envelope. Compare the size measurements with the finished garment measurements to see how much ease is in the design. If your body measurements are between sizes you might want to purchase the smaller size in a 'loose fitting' pattern and the larger size in a 'close fitting' style.

The basic fit description for blouses and dresses is, Close Fitting 0 - 3" of ease, Fitted 3" - 4", Semifitted 4" - 5", Loose 5" - 8", Very Loose over 8". These measurements are just approximates. The exact amount will differ between designers and companies. Look at the line drawings on the pattern envelope for style and construction details. Remember the models in the photos are all very tall and slender.

Blouse and dress patterns should be purchased by the high bust measurement, if the wearers bra size is larger than "B". The high bust measurement is a reflection of the frame size and will make the shoulders and neckline fit better. Several patterns are now being made with extra pattern pieces for different bra sizes. These patterns will provide the right amount of ease over the bust

area. The instructions included with these patterns will guide you through the fitting process. The book 'Fit for Real People' by Pati Palmer is the best guide to making commercial patterns fit your unique body. McCalls line of Palmer/Pletsch patterns are made to work with the book and have more fitting/adjustment lines.

Even with the best descriptions and careful measurement you won't really know how a garment fits until you try it on. The major problem with sewing clothes is you can't try them on before starting the sewing process. The major problem with buying clothes is you have to try on so many of them and settle for the 'best of the lot', often planing to alter them at home. If you and I need a blue, long sleeve, button up blouse, for church choir. I could buy fabric and make a blouse, while you were still driving from the mall to a boutique to downtown. My blouse would fit better and be better made than yours.

Some people say that you can't save money sewing. They are comparing a one-size-fits-nobody T-shirt to a one-of-a-kind blouse. That big box store shirt will shrink and start to fade in three washings. The unique blouse will be worn for three years. There will be lots of other people wearing the same T-shirt, no one will have an identical blouse. Don't confuse **quantity** with **quality**. By sewing your own clothing you get exactly the color you want, with a perfect fit and quality fabric.

Before cutting the special fabric make a practice garment out of something less expensive. It must have about the same thickness and feel of the special fabric. This gives you a

chance to assess the fit. When selecting practice fabric, I only use stuff I like. Life is too short to sew on ugly fabric. If it fits, I have two new garments. A practice garment is a place to work through any unusual construction details.

Once you have perfected a pattern you can use it over and over making changes to the fabric, sleeve length and neck line. No one will ever notice that you are using the same pattern. They will notice how well dressed and confident you appear.

This is wishing everyone a wonderful Thanksgiving. Time for family, friends, and, of course, there is always time for dancing.



Previously an article was written about our State's Heritage Center in the July 1994 edition of The Northeast Square Dancer Magazine. It detailed an 18' by 36' addition to Shuffler's Shanty in Kennewick, which was to house the first

Heritage Center. Since

it was

the building was owned mostly by dancers, felt to be an ideal space to hold the State's memorabilia. In 1985 that area was dedicated and rented from Shuffler's Shanty for \$75 per month. George Grady and Sterling McKenzie created 16 mahogany cabinets with drawers and several display cases with glass for the individual Councils and other significant memorabilia. Rollers were placed on the bottom of the glass cases which facilitated moving and updates to the cases. Many people were involved in the

transport and load/unload of the cabinets: Wayne

McKenzie, Bob Orr, Ken Pomraning, Chick Smith, Charlie

Holman, Laura Ebner and Mary McKenzie.

A governing committee for Heritage Center was set up to include four Dancers-at-Large, four past-Presidents and 12 Delegates (one from each Council). They meet the evening prior to each fall and spring State Federation meeting. The purpose is to document and preserve the history of dancing

in Washington State.

Only the Board may approve loaning of certain objects for display for a specified timeframe. They also determine which items should be accessioned.

In the past years many individuals have been instrumental in accessioning objects into the Heritage Center (Don Blanchard, Hazel



Pomraning, Pat Streamer, Ila Williams, Laura Ebner,
Donzella Leahy and Judy Ottoson) and in updating
the records of the facility (Margaret & Pat Streamer,
Chick & Francis Smith, Bob & Ruth Kramer, Ann &
Les Heikkinen). Bob & Audrey Orr were in charge
of writing descriptions of the new badges and
displaying them on the Badge Boards. Beth Barnes
creates each Festival's square dance attire for "Barbie
& Ken" type dolls. In addition, all Council delegates have

volunteered many hours in and for the Heritage Center.

Eventually, the majority of owners of Shuffler's Shanty quit dancing, so there was a concern that the building would be sold or the space used as a daycare facility. A new hall was being designed in north Spokane, and the lower portion was offered as a possible site for the Heritage Center to be housed. Marguerite and Jesse Villars of Spokane Council were intricately involved with both the Heritage Center and the North Spokane Dance Association. Negotiations continued for two years between the NSDA and the State Federation regarding available space and cost. It was agreed that \$10,000 would be used to cover the building costs of the lower area of the North Spokane Dance Center. Don and Lynda Congrove scheduled workers for coffee service at Interstate rest areas several weekends to raise funds for the designated space.







Ila Williams also offered to match donations up to \$500, until the next January. She also provided funding for the heating/cooling system in the new hall, which unit is housed in the office of the Heritage Center.

By 2005 the lower level of the NSDA hall had been completed, and the display cabinets and all accessioned items were moved into the 36' x 34' space dedicated for the State's Heritage Center archives.

Forms are available for Object or Monetary donations to the Heritage Center, and for Memorials. Each Council is encouraged to submit one set of the official square dance attire from their State Festival, to be stored in the Heritage Center. Councils are also encouraged to fill and update their own display cases with items of interest from their area. The changes in those cases make visiting Heritage Center new and exciting each time.

Many other items are also available for viewing inside the facility: past Footnotes magazines and Directories, Seminar booklets, Round Dance of the



cuing, badges and fun dangles, past Federation President



photos, name plates

of donors, Showcase of Ideas participation in National Square Dance Conventions, recipients of state awards and scholarships, Festival reports, Federation minutes, music equipment, and scrapbooks.

Since I'm a "relative newbie" to the State Federation's great archives, there may be names missed in this writeup – my apologies. Come and visit "our" Center while you're in Spokane – it is a real treasure of information provided/donated by many of our dedicated dancers (past and present).
