# FOOTNOTES • History is in the making

Dear Square Dance Friends,

A history making vote on a change in the By-Laws of the Square and Folk Dance Federation of Washington will soon come your way. Since the change directly affects FOOTNOTES, your editors believe it is important that everyone be properly informed and vote. The change will allow a printed copy of FOOTNOTES to be sent to every Federation home every month as part of our annual dues. In order to accommodate this, a raise in annual dues is required. The By-Laws change means that Federation dues will be increased from the present \$6.00 per person (\$4.50 for Insurance and \$1.50 for the Federation) to \$14.00, an increase of \$8.00 per person annually. If the vote to increase is approved you will begin receiving your Federation Square Dance magazine, FOOTNOTES, in your mailbox every month, 10 months a year beginning in September, 2015. The dues increase would be in effect with our next renewal billing, which must be sent in by May 31, 2015.

At the recent State Federation meeting the elected officers, council representatives and committee chairs unanimously voted for doing this. Now it is up to you. You have an opportunity to change the way FOOTNOTES has been distributed for the past 64+ years. Up to this time it has only been available to those who subscribe.

While this may sound like a lot it is really only a once a year price that should fit into any family's budget. We urge you to consider the following:

1.) Finally a printed copy of FOOTNOTES will arrive in each Federated home every month.

2.) Every square dancer will have the opportunity to find out what is happening throughout Washington from this one major source.

3.) Just think. One ad for a club/council dance will be circulated to the 2,000+ homes, which contain over 3,000 Federation members.

4.) With the new, larger circulation, FOOTNOTES will attract qualified outside advertisers whose services and merchandise will benefit all of us personally.

5.) By September, 2015 most of the present subscriptions to FOOTNOTES will have been fulfilled, but those that have not will be fairly accommodated on an individual basis.

This vote will take place at your own club meeting in the near future. You may have additional questions, which we would be pleased to answer. You may contact the FOOTNOTES editors; Kathy Chase, State Federation President; any of the other Federation officers; your local council representative, and anyone else you know who attended the meeting in Gorst on September 20, 2015.

2018 in Kennewick will be at the 3 Rivers Convention Center. There is a new hotel being built next door. Most of the committee is formed.


# The Festival to beat festivals

# + 50 Members...We're Growing!!

We would like to thank all of the clubs for their efforts in renewing their club and memberships for this dance season. We have now received all renewals for the 2014-2015 dance year.

We lost two clubs and gained one club. The two clubs we lost are the Rockin' Teens from the Rainier Council and North Olympic Callers and Cuers from the North Olympic Council. The Frolickers of the Spokane Council have re-joined the federation as a traveling club. As of this date, we have 3,070 members, which is actually up about 50 members from last year.

At the state meeting in September we handed out to each council the membership lists of the clubs in their council, brought up to date by the membership information returned to us by those clubs. Each club and council can now be aware of what we have in the database for their membership. Let us know if there are any corrections to be made. If you would like an electronic copy, let us know, it can be provided.

Our insurance policy runs from September 1, 2014 through August 31, 2015. You will find a generic copy of our Certificate of Insurance on the state website under the M&I tab. Feel free to print that to include in your club records and to provide proof of insurance to facilities that require them. Remember, some facilities ask to be a 'named insured' on our policy. This is no problem. If a facility asks to be a 'named insured' on our insurance policy, here is the procedure to follow to accomplish this: go to the state website, under the M&I tab, and scroll down to 'GENERAL LIABILITY INSURANCE CERTIFICATE **REQUEST FORM**? Click on that to bring up the form, fill it out on line, print it, and get it back to us via scanning it to email, or snail mail. We will then get you a certificate with the requesting facility being named on that certificate. This request form can be used for special events, regular club dances for the entire year, etc. Just be sure to include the explanation in the 'Description of Event/ Activity' box, and also be sure to include the requesting facility's information on the lower part of the form. If you have any questions, don't hesitate to give us a call.

# Why is lemon juice made with artificial flavoring and dish washing liquid made with real lemons?

Don't forget to send us a list of your students! Please remember, if a student should join multiple clubs, they need only pay the state dues and insurance of six dollars through one club. This would hold true for anyone belonging to multiple clubs, they need to pay their state membership and insurance through only one club. The students are covered by our accident policy for free while they are taking lessons. Upon graduation, they have 10 days to join a club or they will no longer be covered. Now, that being said, we feel that a person should be allowed to be counted as a student in your club for only one year. The whole idea of free insurance for students is to help them get started, not to provide them with free insurance for the rest of their dancing career. We absolutely do not mean to step on anyone's toes, but we are responsible to make sure our insurance requirements are met and not abused and create a situation that could adversely affect our insurance coverage.

Someone asked about sign-in sheets, so we will go over them again. Signin sheets are required at any square dance activity. You may ask everyone to sign their name (it's OK for a couple to be on the same line), or you may use a printed sheet of people's names where they can place a check mark to indicate their attendance at your activity. The sign-in sheet is extremely important for insurance purposes to verify attendance in case of an incident. For insurance purposes, we recommend you keep these sheets for three years.

If some of the above information seems repetitive, that's because it is! We feel that important issues should be repeated as reminders to keep it fresh in people's minds.

As ham sandwiches go, it was perfection; a thick slab of ham, a fresh bun, crisp lettuce and plenty of light brown gourmet mustard. My mouth watering, I carried it to the picnic table in our back yard, picked it up with both hands but was stopped by my wife suddenly grabbing my arm, "hold Jonnie (our 6 week old son) while I go get my sandwich". I had him balanced between my left elbow and shoulder and was reaching for my ham sandwich when I noticed a streak of mustard on my fingers. I love mustard and had no napkin, so I licked it off. # "Harmony or Discord" It's your choice!

- Harmony: The combination of simultaneously sounded musical notes to produce chords and chord progressions having a pleasing effect.
  - agreement or concord.
  - "man and machine in perfect harmony"
- Discord: Disagreement between people.
  - lack of agreement or harmony between things. Music
  - lack of harmony between notes sounding together.

Last month our article had to do with a "Bright Shiny New Tomorrow". What about today. I have noticed a trend in team activity. Be certain Square Dancing and Clubs or Organization Management are a "Team Activity". It requires all of us to create and maintain a harmonious organization. It doesn't seem to matter if the organization is failing, marking time or successful. At some point a difference of opinion, philosophy or conflicting personalities can create discord within the team. Just look at the recent issues going on with our Seahawks. There is discord to a degree because we lost a game and how some of the team reacted. The team became fragmented as it was perceived that the actions of a few represented the mindset of all. The same thing happens 16 | FOOTNOTES

in Square Dance organizations, be they Club, Association, Council, State or National.

In professional organizations, they have developed ways to deal with this sort of thing. They will bring in councilors to resolve the conflict, work in focus groups or in some cases release the person(s) creating the issue. The Miami Dolphins had that problem last year between two of their team members.

Unfortunately in Square Dance organizations do not always have the resources or the temperament to apply these concepts. Often times the discord results in finger pointing, or unkind comments or in the worst case scenario a dancer(s) may choose to leave the activity. Sometimes it is a personal issue sometimes it is systemic. Let me try to explain. We can only hope we recognize these issues in and take steps to resolve them before they escalate. .

Many years ago, I had a personal issue with one of the National Professional Callers associations. I will not delve into what it was but suffice it to say it was a burden I carried for many years. Because of that I joined the other Professional Callers Association. At the time it seemed to be appropriate for me. Recently I began to recognize that in my view both organizations were at loggerheads and that the discord had begun to become very public. I began to re-evaluate my position and organizational membership. I realized that by carrying this old prejudice I was part of the problem. The issue that was many years old had clouded my judgment had long since been resolved by the organization. Furthermore I recognized had not made the effort to embrace the good work had done by the organization that I had the original issue with. At that point I made the decision that by becoming a member of both organizations I may have the opportunity to become part of the solution rather than the problem.

You may ask how this pertains to Club and Organization management. Recently in some local clubs I have noticed a degree of discord. Some members have come to such a divide with regard to opinion or personality that one or the other has chosen leave the club rather than seek a resolution that would be less traumatic. Also new potential members are shying away from joining these club(s) because they see or hear the discord. Unfortunately this type of thing has an extremely negative impact to the club or organization as well as Square Dancing in general. Wouldn't it be better if we took the position, how can I be part of the solution? Square Dance clubs are fragile organizations. They are run by volunteers that are for the most part doing the very best job they know how to do. They may not be doing the job the way "YOU" would do it, but how they are doing it is their way not necessarily the wrong way.

My observations of the clubs and organizations I belong to got me wondering if you and your organizations have the same issues. If so, I would encourage you as a dancer, club or organization member and perhaps an officer to look beyond the differences or personalities and ask yourself "how can I be part of the solution". You can help; create the harmony in your organization. In my working career, we have norms that pertain to meetings. If you are going to bring a problem to the table, also bring a potential solution. This approach seems to work and reduces the overall discord. Also keep an open mind. Someone else might have a good idea. In short we need to find the way to make our clubs and organizations run in harmony not discord. In order to do this it takes the whole team. The benefit will be others will step forward to help run the organization, dances will be more fun and in most cases larger.

November also means it's almost Thanksgiving time: time for those family get-togethers, time for those special dances, and the time when new members are joining our "family" of Square and Round Dancers. The Square and Folk Dance Federation of the State of Washington recently held their September meeting at the Kitsap Square Dance Center in Gorst, Washington. One of the attendees asked me about the Round of the Month program. As we were discussing what is involved in selecting a ROM, he suggested that this might make a great article for Footnotes. Though many of you are familiar with the selection process of the monthly Rounds, there may be some dancers that are not.

I am always looking for new, newer and updated material, which means I am constantly on the lookout for new Round Dances. I visit many cue sheet web sites, and have choreographers send me their new works of art, and am continually looking at the music charts to see what's out there. Once I've chosen several cue sheets, I look at each of the cue sheets to see how they're written and how many "challenges" may be in the dance, I listen to the music to see if it's easy to dance to, and to hear the cues. I also check to see if the music is available to cuers and instructors. I narrow the choices down to three selections, write up quick cues to the chosen dances, make copies of the descriptive cues, and make an MP3 of each music selection. These files are then emailed to each member of the ROM committee and they generally have two weeks to send back their ballots with their first, second and third choices. Once this information has been tallied, we have a new Round of the Month.

If you would like to know the ROM each month and your name isn't on the list, please let me know and we'll get your name and email address added to the

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# Kathy learns from her readers

I would like to thank those of you who have emailed or told me how much you appreciated my last two articles. You have helped me write this month's column and made me feel that I am meeting a need.

The following are some excerpts from an email I received and was given permission to use. I will not be naming names but I appreciate their support and help.

"I loved your article in the footnotes." Okay I had to put this line in because they were so nice to "love" my article.

"And that is so true. When I was married I always asked my husband to dance with every single gal at least once, but there were also other married men in that Council that did the same thing. I have now divorced and moved to a new town and square dance Council. The married men DON"T dance with you if you are single. And there are only about 2-3 single guys. It has taken me two years to get to know the members from the club I joined and the others in this Council."

**KATHY'S COMMENT:** I have to say if you are in a club or council whose dancers are not open to single dancers in, or willing to make the dance enjoyable for your guests, then you need to make it clear you are not open to single dancers. If you make it clear those solo dancers will either make sure they come with a partner or are able to dance all positions. But my personal opinion, I would say you need to take a long look at your club, because what I feel square dancing represents is, friendship, fun and enjoyment. I would also ask you, both, male and female, why are you concerned if the male dancer occasionally asks a single female to dance? Or in reverse, why would you be concerned if your female partner asks a single male to dance?

Even if you can dance all positions my reader comments; "But something you learned in lessons. I don't like to break down the square." A valid point that, to me displays this dancer's concern for those they are dancing with. I only wish all dancers were as concerned with others at the dance. Does this mean you can't have fun if a square breaks down, by no means, my husband and I believed that no matter the reasons you should smile and make all enjoy the tip you just shared with them. If not I have to again say you need to be more vocal about the level and skill of dancer you want to attend your dances. But be warned no one is perfect.

My reader makes this comment; "Some nights are better than others. But it is so easy to talk myself out of going to a dance since I don't have a partner. And then when the club members ask me why wasn't I at the dance? What do I say? Well staying home is better than dressing up and going to the dance and sitting all night."

Here is that reader's final thought and idea; "I wish that if clubs want to keep their members that maybe the singles (men or woman) could put their name in a hat when they come in and then if a man wants to dance he could grab a name out of the hat."

I attended the Washington State Federation Meeting in September and am thankful to my friends on the State level who asked and got me up on the floor often. I will say again these dancers have become a big part of my Square Dance family and I love and appreciate them all.

# Hand Sewing

There are two schools of thought on hand sewing. Some people hate it and will do anything to avoid handwork. Other people love it and will find an evening spent with needle and thread relaxing. Here are some tips for both sides.

Mending must often be done by hand. Some things just won't go under the machine. Get a small laundry basket just for mending. Place a note pad, pencil and safety pins in it. When someone has a garment that needs repair they can pin a note on the item before placing it in the basket. When you sit down to mend everything will be in one place.

Make a sewing basket and keep all of the hand sewing supplies together. A pair of six inch tailor's scissors are perfect for hand work. They must be very sharp to the point and comfortable to use. A small ruler. A retractable tape measure. Small needle nose pliers - If you get into a tight place or the fabric is very heavy they can grip the needle and pull it through. Thimble - There are many different styles and sizes once you find the right one you will not be comfortable without it.

Good lighting is most important. More light is need to sew than to read. 22 | FOOTNOTES www.squa Daylight is best, especially for sewing on black fabric. There are special light bulbs that are close to true daylight and can make it easier to see what you are doing.

Support the work. With the fabric resting on a table you will not be fighting the weight of the project. If you are sitting on the sofa, support the project by placing a pillow on your lap to bring the stitching closer.


Fray Check\* or similar fabric sealant. Use it on the ends of rips to keep them from going further and to seal edges. Allow it to dry completely before going on to the next step. Do not get this stuff on needles, pins or scissors. It will never come off. It can stain delicate fabric.

Bee's wax or Thread Heaven -After threading the needle, pull the thread firmly through the bee's wax. Pinch the thread and scrape your thumb nail down the thread. This will force the wax in and scrap off the excess. Bee's wax will keep the thread from tangling and it will slide through the fabric easier. Thread Heaven is a silicone product that comes in a little blue box. Use it in the same way as bee's wax. The silicone coats the thread and it slips through stiff fabric easier. Professional tailors would never hand sew without bee's wax.

Needle threader - Everyone complains about the difficulty of

threading a needle, but they refuse to use a needle threader. You know, those little pieces of metal with a fine wire loop sticking out of the side. Yes, they still make them. You can find them in the sewing store right next to the needles. If you can't draw the thread through the eye of the needle with the threader, change to a needle with a bigger eye.

Keep your needles in a bar of soap not a pin cushion. Take a bar of soap with the paper wrapper still on it and wrap it in a couple of layers of fleece. Stick all of your needles in the bar. The soap will coat the tips of the needles for a bit of lubrication to help slid through the fabric. The needles won't slip in and get lost in the bar like they will in a regular pincushion. Before



throwing away an old pin cushion cut it open and see how many needles are in it. There are many different types of needles. Keep a good selection on hand and use the size that suits the project and your hands.

Does your dance hall have an emergency sewing kit? You can pick up one at the dollar store that will be good enough to take care of most fashion emergencies. While you are at it get one for each of your cars and one for the RV. If you are planning to go somewhere by plane, one of these little kits will fit in the corner of your suit case.

Sewing touches all parts of our lives. The mattress we sleep on, the clothes we wear and the furniture in our homes are all sewn. When you pick up a needle and thread you connect with the line of stitchers who have made and mended garments throughout history. Savor the accomplishment of stitching and feel the joy of doing something with your hands.

**CPSC CALLERS, CUERS** and all that they do: Many people do not realize what it takes to be a Caller and/or a Cuer these days and I don't only mean the practice and the money put into it, but at a dance or a Convention as well. Many callers and cuers (but not all) are retired and use this as their source of income (kind of like a job after their job) and for those who are not retired, they usually have a full-time job during the week, then call or cue on the weekends, during holidays and over vacations. Calling and/or cueing is exactly that, a full-time job in and of itself and this is why we pay them to call and cue at our club dances.

Now, did you know that callers and cuers pay the same registration price as dancers do to attend festivals like State and Nationals? Why is this so? Why do we pay a National Caller to come in and call two dances, but the local callers who call 6 to 7 times a day have to pay to call? If a regular dance as a caller and cuer is a full-time job, what is a convention considered? Is there anything higher than a full-time job?

The amount of work that goes into calling and cueing at a convention is three-fold, the amount for a regular dance, if not more. You imagine the running from hall to hall to call/cue at all different times of the day, being from mainstream to plus then back again multiple times a day (for cuers from phase II to advanced and back), it can get pretty confusing over time.

So having these callers and cuers pay the registration fee to attend these festivals is like making them pay to go to work. Right? Would you go to work if you had to pay your company instead of them paying you? Doesn't seem fair, does it? When you, as a dancer, go to conventions, you pay to get in and dance all the dances you want. You move from room to room, caller to caller and cuer to cuer. When a caller or cuer (and usually a spouse of some sort) come to a convention like this, they rarely, if at all, actually dance, but rather are making sure that everyone else can dance and have a good time.

Now, while that is being said, I understand it is expensive to put on Festivals like State and Nationals, but would it really hurt that much to let the callers and cuers in for free? I mean, how do you have festival if you only have one caller and cuer? You wouldn't. You need these other callers and cuers or the amount of people that come to festivals would drop dramatically. I am not saying to let every person that walks in and say they are a caller or a cuer get in for free. I am considered a caller, but if I am not calling at said festival, I would not expect to get in for free, but I am saying that the people who are running around all day trying to make festival happen and make it fun for everyone should not have to pay to do just that.

I may use terms like "hostile" or "enemy" but I'm referring to the mental attitude some competitors may have towards other teen clubs. Part of this stems from a bias for their own group, the way they've been trained, previous encounters with other young dancers, and any number of conditions in or outside of the club. Being beaten at competition certainly doesn't foster warm feelings. Maybe they've grown used to the number of people around them. Maybe they don't know anyone new.

Combine all this with an inadequate promotion system and you have the mess modern square dancing has been left with. Kids don't want to circulate to other clubs, clubs don't promote each other, youth square dancing as a whole doesn't grow. Teens age out and go on with life, shrinking the clubs further. The only dancing friends they know are the ones made in the club. They come, they dance, and they leave.

We of the **JACKS & JILL's** are trying to turn that around. We're opening up the doors between youth clubs again, hoping to foster a wider awareness of teen square dancing. We're planning caravans to adult clubs as well as fellow competitors. The goal is to promote so strongly and so widely, that no matter

The effort should include periodically checking the club's website for "dead", outdated (or, worse yet, factually incorrect) links. Websites, digital dance calendars, Facebook pages, etc. (just like old buildings, old gardens, and even some old people...ha, just kidding) may need an occasional "facelift". Don't let your club's digital footprint give your site's visitors a reason to ignore the site in the future because it was last-updated 3 years ago, just "looks" dated, or is full of errors.






