Callers Lab is an international "gang" of square dance teachers and callers. They meet yearly throughout the world. Due to COVID, my folks were not able to attend in 2022. That was the year my father would have been awarded this honor.

Half of a century of square dance calling. Clearly, this is more than a hobby for my parents.

My parents have been dancing even longer than 50 years. In 1967, under doctors order, my parents took square dance lessons. Actually, it was to get out of the house, away from their very colicky daughter, once a week. My dad didn't want to take lessons. But after one week...he was hooked. Returning to class the next week, wearing black cowboy boots and supporting a black cowboy hat! They haven't stopped dancing since then.

It became a family "thing" for us. Not just our family of four but extended family as well. I have two sets of grandparents who belonged to clubs and supported them. I have aunts and uncles on both sides of my family who also square danced. What a wonderful dancing family! Our family of four, danced as well. My childhood memories are sprinkled with campouts where dad learned to flip pancakes on the griddle. I remember 'helping' my dad teach "the round of the month" at Callers League on Sunday afternoons. That was when rounds were not cued but memorized by the dancer. And although I don't remember it, we camped in a tent for the Penticton Festival in 1972. My younger brother was five days old. In a tent!! when he was five days old!! (Read that twice). I used to love traveling to Penticton. Meeting up with friends to dance and float the river. The first year that my dad was asked to MC, he and I kept that a secret all week from my mom. So that she was surprised when it was announced on Saturday night. We went on cruises, more than one! I was fortunate to visit the Carribean with my grandparents. I danced on the ship with my Grandpa Clyde to Miss Frenchy Brown. How lucky was I? We spent time at the lake, at the park, in backyards BBQing with dancers. Square dancers are a great bunch to have as friends.

Lots of friends have come and gone. We celebrated engagements, celebrated weddings, celebrate anniversaries, celebrated vetrans, and celebrated to say our goodbyes. That is what happens when you are in an activity as involved as square dancing.

I would love to know how many miles the cars have had put on them to dancing activities. Many weekends we traveled to the Western Dance Center on Friday nights for party dances. Saturday mornings for lessons with Dixie Chain Gang, the youth group. Saturday nights we were back out there dancing again. Only to return on Sunday, for Area Counsel and Callers League. I have memories of driving to the hall when there were no homes or businesses around the valley area. And now, that area is known as the Spokane Valley with its own zip codes. But we can't talk about miles without talking about miles on the sewing machine. I wonder how many spools of thread? inches of ruffles and lace? My mom and I still talk about certain dancing memories by the fabric in our dresses. My mom sewed matching shirts and ties for dad so that she could spot him easily giving hugs on the dance floor. (I don't know if that is actually true. But it should be.) Now that my mother cues rounds, my dad is free to dance with the single ladies.

My mom and dad have always supported square dancing. Something you probably don't know, is my parents are always willing to do 'One-Nighters". This is one way of encouraging new dancers. Together, they are invited to church gatherings or homeschool groups to dance for the night. He teaches just what they need to know to have a great time! Dad and Mom have gone to the same church groups year after year. They always look forward to calling for the singles groups as well. It takes time to prepare for these and patience to make it through the night. People that don't dance don't realize that they need to be quiet in order to hear the directions.

Callers never stop learning. They always want to improve. Now there are computer programs for callers to use when planning a dance. But when I was younger, Dad used to "borrow" our Fisher-Price people moving them around the kitchen table when planning for dances. Leadership seminars have always filed our calendars and vacations. In fact, I remember going to the callers 'school' by Wade Driver, the week before the Seattle National in 1981. I could go on-and-on about how dancers and dancing have infiltrated my life.

Thank you to all who have supported my parents for half a century. We ALL value your friendship--the laughs, the memories, and the journeys. I hope that all of you realize what that means to us. Friends, you are 'our' extended family. I am sending a 'yellow rock' to each and every one of you. And if you are not a dancer, YET! Lessons start in the fall—you don't know what you are missing!

## **Nomination for McNutt Award**

The Melody Mixers Round Dance Club in Kennewick, WA would like to nominate Bill and Karen HolmFor the 2022 Mc Nutt Award. They have done an outstanding job of teaching and promoting RoundDancing as a wholesome recreation for all ages of dancers, both young and old. They have mentored teens for the Pacific NW Teen Festival Competition, as well as 30-90-year-olds for dancing enjoyment.

They have taught many different rhythms and phases to all ages of dancers, including two step, waltz, cha cha, tango, rumba, jive, and fox trot. They need to be specifically recognized for their tireless and inspiring work in the field of round dancing. As round dance teachers, they are very patient and encouraging, providing tips and showing examples of each step/move they teach. If a person is having problems with a move, they work individually with that person to master the move.

Bill started dancing in the early 70's in Cheyenne, Wyoming. Harry Haager's dad had round dancing in his basement. Back then all rounds were memorized. They were just starting to have a few cued dances. At this time Bill became interested in cueing. Harry's dad worked with Bill on learning to cue.

The club cuer was retiring and they needed a replacement. Bill became the club cuer in 1972 and continued as cuer/teacher for approximately 35 years, starting in Cheyenne, Wyoming and Ft. Collins, Colorado area which is just across the border.

Bill is a charter member of ROUNDALAB, which started in 1976.

Bill and Karen met in 1994 and married a few years later. They became a dynamic team promoting and teaching rounds, in the states of Wyoming, Colorado, and later Washington.

In August 2009 they left Colorado and moved to Tri Cities in Washington State. They danced with the local clubs, the Columbia River Squares and also the Prairie Shufflers Club. Being he was a well-seasoned cuer before ever moving to Washington, word got around that Bill could cue and so the local callers would ask Bill to cue sometimes. On New Year's Eve, Bill and Karen were planning on staying home having a nice time around the fireplace in their home. They got a call around 4PM from Umatilla, Oregon, 30 miles away. They needed a cuer. There was predicted an ice storm that night and the out-of-town cuer didn't want to be driving back home on icy roads, and so canceled. So, Bill agreed to be the replacement cuer. Everyone liked his cueing. Bill and Karen implemented a round dance program for the Prairie Shufflers Square Dance club. In the fall of 2010 the previous round dance club, Melody Mixers wanted to start back up with Bill as their regular cuer. Since then, bill has cued at various local club's dances, as well as Anniversary Dances, and special events in Eastern Washington.

Bill and Karen are semi-retired and remain active helping to train the new cuer for the Melody Mixers round dance club.



T thought it would be interesting to look at some club Land caller history this month, and list today's active clubs along with the clubs and callers of the past. This will be based on The Mount Baker council areas foot print, but maybe it will inspire someone in your council to do and share some research in your council area too. It is by memory, and we apologize if our recollection misses any details or has inaccurate info. It does show how long we've been in the activity, so a little memory lapse is probably not surprising!

Whatcom County currently has Rainbow Squares with Brent Mawdsley as their caller and Oren Gaskill as their teacher. But back a few years there was the See Sevens with their caller, and Melody Square Dance Hall where the Western Squares danced with Bob Parrish as their caller and Howard Steiner, then Bob Berka as their cuer. Before that there was Barr's Barn with Glen Barr as the owner and I believe a caller, and the Whatcom Wranglers danced there with their caller Joe, and I can't remember his last name There was also a teen club called the Whatcom Teens and I called for them when I was at college in Bellingham.

Island Co. had Whidbey Whirlers with caller Hal Ramaley, then Skip Duquette and Walt Anthis, and their last caller was Bob Cadwallader, and Bob Berka as the cuer. Norm Shaller started a club on the south side of the Island, and I don't remember its name, and Mike McCalib is trying to start Whidbey Flying eights.

Skagit County has Skagit Squares with John Corrigan as their caller; I am their teacher, and Bob Berka is their cuer, but before John, there were Pat Mugrage, Bob Wright Jr, and Jack Keefer. Fidalgo Fogcutters is the current Plus club with guest callers. Past callers were John Corrigan, myself and Hal Ramaley. Years ago the singles broke away from the Skagit Squares and formed the Mount Baker Singles with Jerry Johnson as their caller/cuer. I became their caller/cuer after Jerry left and called for them until they folded recently. The Skagit Teens danced in the seventies with Ed Holeok as their caller.

Snohomish Co. currently has A Blast with guest callers and cuers, the Dudes and Dolls with Scott Coon and Debbie Tayler, Dancing Shadows with Debbie Taylor as the cuer, East side Plus with Steve Noseck, Fern Bluff Squares with Rob Sax, Freewheelers with Roger Spiese and Spyder Webb, Happy Hoppers with me as their teacher, Square Crows With Vance Morrison as their teacher and Karen Neverdowski as their cuer, Samena Squares with Steven Cole as their teacher, and Karen Neverdowski as their cuer, Sky Valley Whirlwinds using guest callers, Whirlybirds with me as their caller and Karen Neverdowski as the cuer.

But in the past, there were:

Checkerboard Squares, Country Cousins, Dancing Jewels, Dancin' Vigilantes, Do's & Don't's, Eastmont Hillbillies, East Side Twirlers. There were two Evergreen Square Clubs, Fred Cassasa called for the first one, Evergreen Teens, Frontier Squares, Hayloft Rounds, Haylofters, Hilltop Highlanders which became the Highlanders, Hoosier Hot Shots, Ins & Outs, Knotty Squares, Lace & Levis, Pistols & Petticoats (they became Clubhouse Kickers), Rompin' Rascals, Renegades, Russell n Dees, Scramblin' Squares, Shirts & Skirts, Single Stars, Silver Trails, Stanwood Sashayers, Swingin' Teens, Toe Stompers.

And we have and had privately owned halls:

The Hayloft in Lynnwood, Maylon and Marie Dickenson's Barn on the Tulalip Reservation, Bud and Marg Alexander's Promenade Hall In Everett, and the hall in Lynnwood run by Seaveys & Chambers.

Then there are the callers of the past who called regularly within the borders of Mount Baker Council:

Before we do that, we wanted to provide a few final thoughts. When we took this role, we had a few goals in mind - we hope we were at least somewhat successful.

Our first goal was that we wanted to articulate how big Round Dancing really is. Round Dancing is worldwide in scope with Cuers, Teachers and Choreographers all over the world dedicated to growing our beautiful activity. Throughout the year as we identified the Washington Round of the Month winners, we reached out to each of them to let them know that they had won and to solicit a short biography from each to share with our readers in Footnotes. When dancing "River Town" I like to think of Warwick Armstrong with his wife Paula choreographing dances in their Drawing Room in

Queensland Australia, planning their next dance or weekend event. We ourselves have met far too few, but each time we meet one of our dance teacher heroes It's an absolute thrill. Talking with Ed and Karen Gloodt in an elevator in San Diego at ICBDA, cueing dances together with Peter and Chama Gomez in Reno during USA West, getting private tutoring with Rey and Sherry Garza in Minneapolis at Starfest - we feel so blessed to be just a small part of the lives of these people who are such a big part of the activity we all love. We in Washington state can sometimes forget that locally, we are blessed with some of the premier dance teachers in the world. We have the ability to learn from and dance to the likes of Randy and Marie Preskitt or Paul and Debbie Taylor anytime we want. These teachers often get small crowds locally but across the country and around the world they are revered, and people understand what a privilege it is to get just a few hours of instruction from them. In addition, we have so many other Cuers and Teachers not so well known - but so dedicated to their craft. Make a point when you see them to let them know how much you value their knowledge, teaching and friendship.

We also had a goal to provide just a little bit of guidance. For those who would like to learn how to Round Dance we provided some pointers on how to get started and how to enjoy the wonderful journey you have become a part of. For those who are experienced dancers and are happy where you are - we wanted to give encouragement to keep dancing, keep a smile on your face and enjoy the activity. For those who want to continue to progress to Intermediate or



to Advanced levels of dancing - we hope that some of the pointers we provided helped at least a little bit. We took that information and provided it at the Washington State Leadership conference that many of you attended, as well. Sometimes just one small pointer or bit of instruction can take you to the next level. One last bit of advice – enjoy your partner, enjoy the dance and enjoy your dancing friends. Remember dancing is supposed to be fun - so have fun and smile.

Finally, we had the goal of simply sharing our love of the activity. Wendy and I love to dance and want the activity to grow. We need more leaders in this activity. We are excited that Charles and Katie Morehead will be teaching beginning lessons in Tacoma. In addition, Thell and Jennifer Rooney have taken on a club in the Tri-Cities, and are beginning to cue and teach. I'm sure there are others as well, new teachers who are wondering how they are going to do it, maybe scared to death. Our advice would be to find a mentor to bounce off your questions. Plan your lessons carefully then jump in with both feet confidently. Enjoy the journey. If you have a yen to learn to teach or are experienced, Sharon and Casey Parker are putting on a clinic for Round Dance teachers September 30 through October 2 in Spokane WA. This is one of those unique opportunities that doesn't come around often to learn from Round Dance leaders who have been around for a long time who have a background in education - to simply learn how to teach or refine the skills you already have. Take advantage of it if you can.

To us, passing the torch is bittersweet. We have enjoyed being a part of your lives every month. Writing the monthly articles and identifying the Rounds of The Month. Teaching at Leadership Weekend was so much fun! However, getting the time back to focus on our teaching, dancing, learning and choreography will be a bit of a relief. We hope that in everything we have done this year supporting Round Dancing as your Washington Round Dance Coordinators we have added a little bit to enhance your love of this beautiful activity whether it be as dancers, teachers, cuers or choreographers. We aren't going anywhere. Starting in September, we will be teaching Beginning Waltz and Foxtrot in Gorst - and beginning Bolero in Olympia. We will be cueing at dances and festivals. We are sure to see you somewhere sometime on the dance floor. When we do, come say hi! This activity is not just about the dancing it's also about the friendships and we value those friendships with our dancing friends.

MEET SHASTA

Last summer I had the privilege of attending the 53rd Education and Leadership Seminar.

On Saturday, Dan Preedy led a session on "Socialization in Square Dancing." To quote from his notes, "What is socialization? Definition: The activity of mixing socially with others."

Now that catches the attention of solo dancers who began square dancing to meet friends and get exercise at the same time.

Throughout the history of square dancing, our activity has been known as a way of getting together with friends: dinner before the dance, dessert afterward; weekend campouts; travel to other dance events; a game night at someone's home; these activities naturally led to a tightknit square dance community that held many of our closest friends.

In a session called "The History of Square Dancing," Dave Boggs talked about the need to reinvent ourselves and to think about the people who influence you. Let your mind go from activity to people. Don't find yourself in a rut; experiment with new types of music and dress. Things we have done in the past may not work anymore, so be ready for new ideas. This past year I have been to a few memorial services for dancers who have passed on, and as I look around the room, most of the room has been full of their square dance friends, church, and family.

Last week I attended a quincianera for a newly graduated dancer whose family had recently moved to our area. Most of the attendees were square dancers, the rest were family and church friends.

These friendships don't happen by themselves. In recent years we have lost that interaction due to many reasons: computers, texting, too many opinions on "the best way to …," creating an inability to get along.

According to Dan Preedy, Callerlab began recognizing this, and formed a Social Connections Committee to develop ways to make our activity more social and share ways to interact. To research ideas, go to https:// knowledge.callerlab.org or enter "Social Connections" in the search bar to access many shared ideas and activities



that are currently being used by other groups, such as a bowling night and dinner with prizes for high score, most gutter balls, most original form, etc.; mini golf tournament and ice cream, with prizes for highest, lowest, hole-inone, etc.; hatchet throwing and dinner; hot tub and wine tasting.... The ideas are endless, and it just takes one person to start the ball rolling.

Phrases that can never be used if we are to succeed are:

- 1. We tried it, it didn't work.
- 2. We have never done it that way.
- 3. I don't like it.
- 4. I am just trying to help.

We must also be aware of the "fun suckers." These are the folks who are never happy and always find fault and criticize others. Keep politics out of lessons. Focus on comraderie and activities outside of the club.



### C. P. R. Crinoline Petticoat Re-fluff-a-tation

There must be a dozen ways to fix a slip that has lost its lift or give more bounce to a thin slip. The only one that will not wash out or flake off is fishing line. This is not any more time-consuming than other methods and will never have to be redone again. Control the amount of lift by the weight of the fishing line. This will work on any slip, any fabric.

Materials

- 1. Fishline 20, 30, and 60-pound test. Buy the cheapest that is available; it has more spring. The more expensive type is softer and limper.
- 2. Monofilament sewing thread This will work on any color slip. It is finer than regular thread, so more can be wound on the bobbin. When sewing with clear nylon thread, reduce the upper tension to the number two setting. This thread stretches during sewing, creating self-tension.

Wind the bobbins only half full of monofilament thread. Trying to overfill a bobbin can cause it to break or bend. Skip some tension guides when winding monofilament thread to reduce stretching. Regular sewing thread can be used for this project.

- Size 80 or 90 sharp needle Set the machine for 10 per inch (2.5 mm) stitch length and a small zigzag. Use a regular sewing foot or an appliqué foot.
- 4. A boom box, a stack of favorite CDs, and a cup of coffee. This will take a while, but the results are well worth it.

Set-Up

Put the fish line to the right of the machine. It needs to be in a box or holder to wind off straight, like toilet paper. It will twist and kink if it sits on the flat side and spirals off. Pull several



yards loose and let them lie on the floor. Trying to pull the fish line off the reel while sewing doesn't work. It will be too tight. Keep the cat out of the room while doing this.

The easiest way to get the fish line to the presser foot is to run it through a clip attached to the work light over the machine. If there isn't a work light, consider getting one. Did you know that twice as much light is needed for sewing than reading?



Thread the fishline through the clip, directly down in front of the machine, and to the presser foot. Once the fish line is started under the presser foot, it will not have to be guided. It will slip between the toes of the foot. Look for a presser foot that has a groove running front to back. This will allow the foot to ride straighter on the ridge of the fish line. This is usually called an appliqué or a buttonhole foot.

Start with a 20-pound test fish line on the bottom edge of the slip. Slide about six inches of fishline under the foot so that there is something to hold on to. Place the bottom edge of the slip under the foot and under the fish line. Take a sip of coffee. Start sewing.

To prevent the slip from gathering on the fish line, a possible problem, hold the slip behind the presser foot and pull it slightly. Also, make sure the fish line is running free from the reel. Stop and pull more line off and let it lie on the floor. Put a clothespin on the edge of the slip where you start sewing and sew for about two yards. Stop, with the needle down, and lift the presser foot. Run your fingers down the edge of the slip toward the machine to chase out any gathers, and then pull more fishline through and under the foot as needed. Lower the presser foot. Place a second clothespin behind the presser foot where you stopped. Sew for a couple of yards and check for gathering. Depending on the machine and the type of slip being worked on, this step might not be necessary. Keep moving this second clothespin forward as you sew. The first clothespin will show you how far you have gone. At the end, overlap the stitching for a few inches and trim off the excess fish line.

If there is lace or a ruffle on the bottom edge of the slip, you can sew the fish line right above it. This works for the soft nylon type of slip. They are still soft and pack well but are fluffier.

Use the 20-pound test fish line on the bottom of the slip. The 30-pound test on the middle layers and the 60-pound test at the top. This will lift the top of the slip and prevent that dip in the middle. Once you have done this, you can determine exactly how much lift you like.

You can also use fishline on your skirts. Use a 20-pound test inside the bottom edge. You can zig-zag just like the slip using matching thread, encase the fish line in a rolled hem, or serge the bottom edge with the fish line inside the serging. This is the way they make those standout ruffles for fancy gowns. Use a 30 or 60-pound test on the tiers' seams, depending on the fabric's weight. This will make it look fuller and newer.

### Vernon (Vern) D. Boggs

April 8, 1960 – August 10, 2022

Life-long resident of Spokane, passed into eternity after a short battle with liver disease. Vern was the first child of Dave and LaVonne Boggs. He was raised on the north side of Spokane attending J.J. Browne elementary, Glover Junior High and graduating from Shadle Park in 1978.
