For those clubs giving lessons, do not forget to send us a list of your students' names, addresses, and telephone numbers. You do NOT need to send money for the students as long as they are taking lessons. Students are covered by our insurance while they are going through lessons. Upon graduation, the student is covered for 10 more days. At that time, the student must join a club and pay the \$6.00. If they do not join a club within the 10 day period, they will no longer be covered after lessons. A new graduate joining your club would be handled the same as any person joining the club, send us their name, address, and telephone number along with the required \$6.00 per member. A club may add new members during the dance year by simply sending us the new person's name, address, and most importantly, their telephone number, along with a check for \$6.00 per member.

We are happy to report that we have received all clubs' renewal information. My mom taught me that if you can't say something nice

We have lost four clubs in the federation: Shirts & Skirts, Mount Baker Council; Frolickers, Shirts & Skirts, and Spurs & Skirts, Spokane Area Council. That leaves us with 103 clubs, and 2,722 members as of August 31, 2017, a loss of about 30 members from last year. This is a tentative figure until we complete the audit.

For the third year, instead of handing out paper at the fall state meeting we will be emailing up-dated club membership information to each council treasurer. We are asking each council to print off the membership list of their clubs and distribute them accordingly.





Snow?!? Here comes "Suzie Snowflake" dressed in her snow-white gown. Back a hundred and three years ago when I was a kid, we listened to that song on a 'Little Golden Record' played at 78 rpm on our phonograph. That was the 50s when drinking water out of a hose was still okay. Also back then – What do you get if you cross an elephant with a rhino? Elephino.

It's All about Dancers

Not all Square Dancers are created equal. Remember to measure the ability of the dancers before using a less common or more challenging setup for a particular move. Even though dancers are exposed to various setups of the moves as they progress through a given level of Square Dancing, it is only through dancing those various setups that the dancer attains a level of competency and comfort in execution. So, during that first tip of a dance, it's best to assess. Give them enjoyment and some challenge, but don't you dare turn that smile upside down.

Neglected Move

How many times was 'Wheel Around' called at the last dance you called or attended? It may not have been called at all, or at most once or twice. So, let's explore the move so we can stop neglecting it.

CallerLab provides the following definition for 'Wheel Around'. Starting formation: Couple. Dance action: The couple, working as a unit, turns around to the left (180 degrees). The left-side dancer backs up while the right-side dancer moves forward. The pivot point is the handhold between the two dancers. Ending formation: Couple. Styling: Dancers use a couple handhold or maintain the handhold from the previous call (e.g., Promenade). They adjust the handhold as they finish Wheel Around if required by the next call.

This move is most often used while couples are promenading, however it can be danced by couples (facing or not), and from lines (facing or not). The action of the

move results in the couple facing the opposite direction, as does Courtesy Turn, California Twirl, and Partner Trade. So why even have Wheel Around as part of the program? The differences are that (1) both Courtesy Turn and California Twirl are done by 'normal couples' (boy-left, girl-right), whereas Wheel Around can be danced by any 'couple', and (2) with Wheel Around the flow of the right-hand dancer for follow-up moves such as Flutterwheel or Dixie Style to a Wave is enhanced over that of Partner Trade. So, let's all Wheel Around next time we're at a dance.

Remember, it's all about dancers, and keeping them smiling and dancing; the rest of it will take care of itself. As always, I welcome your comments and questions.



PARTS & PIECES

For a garment to be perfect all of the factors must work together. There is a vast difference between 'home made' and 'custom creation'. That gulf is bridged by understanding all the requirements and attention to detail.

Style - Photographs in pattern books are all beautiful. Those women are well paid for their ability to pose. What you don't see is the make-up artist and hair stylist stepping off the set. Or the wardrobe person who taped and pinned the dress, in the back, so that it fits perfectly. Some of those garments are not even finished. Back zippers are left out and hems are taped in place.

When considering a photograph, place a scrap of paper over the model's face. Your eyes are drawn to her eyes. By removing the face, focus is on the garment. Does that style suit your body? Is a large bow, on your derrière, where people's eyes should go?

Destination - Where are you going to go in that style? It may be a perfect cocktail dress, but if you never go out to expensive restaurants, what good is it? Consider how long it is going to take to create the dress plus the expense. Then factor in how many times you are going to wear it. It maybe more cost effective to purchase a dress for one occasion. You might consider renting a dress that you will only wear once.

Fabric - Always read the suggested fabric list on the envelope. Your choice doesn't have to be exactly from the list, but it must have the same hand. That means the feel, drape and body. Trying to make gathers in a stiff fabric won't work. There are so many different fabrics that no one can keep up with all the new names. Find the first fabric listed on the pattern envelope, feel it fold it and scrunch it in your hand. The designer of the pattern had this fabric in mind. Now go looking for other fabrics that have that same consistency.

Color - We all know what colors suit our skin tone and hair color. Most people instinctively select the colors that are right for them. No one can wear all colors. The seasonal system of color selection works. Clothes from one season will mix & match easily. Wearing clothing that enhances your complexion will make you feel better and that will show in your attitude and posture. There are times we are stuck with a certain color, as in a brides maid's dress or a club outfit. On those occasions just smile and keep going.

Fit - So many times have I heard someone wail, "Patterns don't fit me!" Well, here is a news flash. They don't fit anybody. Patterns are made to fit a mythological average. They have to start somewhere, so they invented this ordinary shape. There are 45 measurements in the complete fitting of a pattern. No one has all 45 numbers the same as the pattern. Learn where you differ from the pattern and what changes need to be made to the pattern before cutting into the fabric. You can't make the garment and then try to make the alterations afterward and get a perfect fit. Invest some time in learning how to make pattern alterations and sewing will be more rewarding. Pati Palmer's book Fit for Real People is my favorite fitting book.

Workmanship - Study the techniques in the instructions, they are essential to the results. If you have never made a placket or a cuff before, practice on some scrap fabric. Make practice pieces in the same fabric as the garment. Those 'extra' lines of stay stitching and under stitching give the garment its polish and style. Have all supplies at hand before starting and things will go more smoothly.

Time - You cannot do your best work when under pressure. Hasty decisions will be very apparent in the final garment. Sewing late at might or when you are distracted will create mistakes. More time will be spent trying to repair the damage than in productive sewing.

Enjoyment - Sewing should be your time of relaxation and creativity. If you didn't enjoy making that skirt, you won't enjoy wearing it. Making dance outfits is fun because individuality is encouraged. Too much lace - never. Colors that can be seen from outer space - our favorites. As with all other activities, some people like it simple, others enjoy more complex. Make only what you want to make. If you don't enjoy sewing - don't do it.

Let's Hang Out!

Do you ever feel like you could be doing more to promote square dancing? Well you probably could! By dancing outside of your home club, you reap many benefits. First, you become a better dancer as you learn to dance to multiple callers/cuers and styles. The variations between voices, elocution, and styles of calling can be a learning experience all on its own, but when coupled with different styles of choreography and personalities, you can develop skills that can be used anywhere. The more callers you dance to the better dancer you will be.

Developing friendships is a major reason people dance. This is so important that there is even a popular phrase "Square Dancing is Friendship Set to Music". When you go to different clubs, you are increasing your sphere of friendships as well as influence. For example, Steve McKay of Tacoma gets a group from the Rainier Council to demo square dancing at the Washington State Fair every year. Because of his friendship and connections, there were more than 25 dancers from the Youth club of a different council that danced at the demo as well and they all had a fantastic time. Many passersby got to see that square dancing is fun for all ages.

By visiting other clubs, you get to meet and connect with other dancers, forming a stronger square dancing community as a whole. When you attend events like the Washington State Square Dance Festival or Circle 8 weekends, etc., you get to reconnect with many of the friends you've made along the way and it becomes a much more exciting and highly anticipated event.

The friendships that any given dancer has is not limited to the people within a single club. Traveling to different clubs is an opportunity to ope0n the doors of friendship and thus, influence. For example, if you live in Maple Valley and have

friends in Lacey that want to learn to square dance, because of all the great dances you've attended in Olympia, you would know that the people there are GREAT and even though the people in Maple Valley are GREAT as well, it would be more convenient for your friends to learn to dance in Olympia. You therefore ask your Olympia friends for lesson information, give your friends the time and date and your friend now has a connection. (Or point them to their Facebook club page, club website etc.) Then your friends become great dancers and you get to dance with them when you visit their club or at the next State Festival. How cool is that? That's influence. But that connection wouldn't have just happened if you hadn't gone to Olympia and met dancers there.

Finally, by visiting different clubs, you are supporting square dancing as a whole. It helps spread friendship locally and regionally. Your own enthusiasm coupled with the excitement of having more dancers on the floor, creates its own positivity, encouraging the activity to grow. And that's what we all need!

If you want a good way to help your local teen club, the Pacific Northwest Teen Square Dance Festival (PNTSDF) badges are available for a \$2 donation and can be purchased through the youth clubs. Money raised helps put on the teen festival.

SQUARE & FOLK DANCE FEDERATION MEETING

September 16, 2017, Centralia, Washington

Recording Secretary, Bev Mustard read the motions from May's meeting.

Treasurer, Bill Reid reported \$1,866 paid out for badges, engraving, printing, postage, advertising, travel expense and website fees. August balance of \$107,575 is in a money market account, of which \$1,767 is designated for Youth Scholarships; with checking balance of \$1,628.

Corresponding Secretary, Lu Simmons expects the Directories to be in by September's end; if you want one, let her know: \$5.00 each.

Education & Leadership, Margaret Kiser reported that 2018 will be the 50th seminar, with Steve Noseck calling and Neva Reid cueing. This will be a Big Celebration!

Festivals: 2017 reported 837 registered, with 77 RV sites. 2018 will feature Jerry Junck and Sharon & Casey Parker; motels within walking distance of the Three Rivers Convention Center. Ways & Means and registrations available. 2019 features The Ghost Riders band with four or five national callers; registration available online.

Tom Rohde audited the Treasurer, Leadership and Footnotes; everything checked out.

Kitty Ogg passed out tax forms (correlating to 990EZ) for the various committee treasurers. August 31 2017 balance information is needed to compile the Federal Income Tax Report due on January 15, 2018.

Bev Mustard mentioned that Heritage Center has requested new boards made for the various recognitions, as several of the plaques are full.

Membership/Insurance - Barbara Snyder reported the loss of four clubs in the Federation, leaving us with 103 clubs and 2,771 members (about the same count as last September). Individual club membership will be emailed; they request each Council to print off the membership list of their clubs and distribute them. Don't forget to send your student list, if your club gives lessons. Students have 10 days to join and add insurance after graduation.

FOOTNOTES - Kathy Chase apologized that FOOTNOTES on line was out late: Check it out at Squaredance-footnotes.com .

Publicity & Promotion - Lane Johnston's that the beginning square dance programs in the Olympia area are clearly positive due to community outreach. It's an on-going,

sustained promotional effort. He mentioned the "Mob Squad 2017" at the State Fair and the use of WheresTheDance.com to check out area dances.

BMI/ASCAP - Bruce has received funds (\$239.00) to send to BMI for the 2017 State Festival. It's based on the total individuals and amount received from the registered dancers. ASCAP bill is due in January for 2018 (2017's payment was \$125.00).

NSDC - Don Pruitt reported 3,654 attended Cincinnati's National Square Dance Convention, and mentioned the Guinness Book of Records event with 1,656 dancers in squares. 2017 NSDC paid Guinness \$1,500 to get the individual from London there to verify numbers. If you get a chance, see The Ark near Williamstown, Kentucky; it's incredible! 2018 has three hotels across the street from the Convention Center in Kansas City, Missouri - register and attend, if you can. 2019 is near Atlanta, Georgia. 2020 will be in Spokane; the Services Committee will need local help - contact Gene & Barbara Morton or Cindy Schoen if you can assist.

Round Dance Coordinator - Mary Parsons announced the Round of Month for September is Cincinnati Fireball, a Phase II two-step.

Sou'Wester Council, Tanya Currier (for Bob Spain who recently passed away). Next council dance is September 30 at Lac-a-Do Hall. Most clubs have begun lessons. At Lac-a-do, they had 11 squares (31 new dancers plus angels). We now have an email to pass information on to dancers within the Council regarding special dances, dances, sickness and deaths.

Spokane Area Council, Beth Barnes filled in for Joshua Strickler, who is involved with the Interstate Fair this weekend. 2017 Hall of Fame recipients were announced at 61st Salmon BBQ: David & Karen Reichardt. Council again paid for a site within the vendor area at Spokane Interstate Fair, where clubs were assigned a specific day to dance within the tent. Ken Ritucci is calling for fifth weekend dances in September. Karen Reichardt publicized lessons in a wide variety of publications. Special dances were listed from many of the clubs.

Blue Mountain Council, Merri Anne Huber mentioned promotion for upcoming lessons at a booth in the park during "The Rocks". The Wallowa Mountain Rendezvous was a fabulous time. Muddy Frogs members volunteer in many other organizations, showing their generosity, care and

concern. Prairie Shufflers enjoyed the State Festival, and begin lessons September 15 & 21. Tri Cities Circulators are a plus club, and Melody Mixers are dancing every Tuesday evening. Sherwood Trust may be a grant source.

Central Area Council, Russ Kruse announced Gateswingers' 63rd anniversary dance on December 2. Thanks to the 16 squares of dancers who made the Memorial Plus Weekend a big success. Blue Agates dance at Swauk-Teanaway Grange near Cle Elum with Daron Tandberg calling. Silhouette Dancers next dance is September 30 in Moxee with Adam Christman calling and Connie Clark cueing.

Central Puget Sound Council, Pat Hoot mentioned preparation for beginner classes. Wayne Easton is retiring (celebration this evening) after 50+ years of calling. Caravans, special dances and Boots & Laces 67th Anniversary (November 6 with Hatch Brothers and Debbie Taylor) were mentioned.

Evergreen Council, Elmer Toops mentioned the "4 x 8" format that Happy Hoppers are using; Silver Stars is a traveling club.

Mount Baker Council, Larry Long mentioned Samena Squares' dance at the Marina Pavilion; they played "Human Bingo" to get to know club members better. "Dancing Angel Workshop" held by Dudes and Dolls included history and development of programs, appropriate talking, touching, styling, etiquette, repairing the square, inclusion, nurturing, mentoring and listening - AND having fun. "Hot topic" was the club's loss of tax-exempt status.

North Central Council, Judy Schock reported on the officers, lessons and dances, as well as Youth competition awards to Chloe Schmidt and 4×8 's "The Wild Red Hoods". Council dances are alternately hosted by each club.

Peninsula Council, Missie Sewell mentioned campout, picnics, demos, rummage sales, work at the hall and dancing at the Kitsap County Fair; with the "turnbuckle" dance at Gorst on October 21. Dan Dubiak mentioned his goal to increase round dance numbers; it's more dancing.

Rainier Council, Tom Tomlinson reported demonstrations and no-experience necessary dances and demonstrations. Classes begin in September and October. We hope others will go dark in support of the May 19 State Meeting dances. Rainier Rendezvous planning is underway for 2019 in Puyallup. Dances listed on https://www.wheresthedance.com/.

Tabled motions were removed from the table and voted to send for the dancers to vote upon, regarding updating Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws to comply with non-profit status.

Publicity & Promotion, Cheryl Pruitt, mentioned that the Governor's Proclamation (of square dancing being the state's official dance) will be in the next issue of Footnotes.

BMI/ASCAP, Bruce Ottoson suggested the State Federation become a member of SESAC (Society of European Stage Authors & Composers). He made a motion to the effect, and the Motion passed.

License Plate Book - Dick Blewett has the book listing distribution of license plates.

Motion by Pat Hoot, seconded by Judy Schock, to provide complimentary State Directory to each elected officer, committee chairman and area delegate. *Motion carried*. Begins 2017-18.

Motion by Judy Ottoson, seconded by Pat Hoot, to purchase two recorders (one as backup) for State functions, to be available by the Federation meeting in February. *Motion passed*.

Motion by Elmer Toops, seconded by Judy Schock that paragraph B of Article 7 of the By-Laws be changed to include "standing committees". *Motion tabled* until next meeting.

Sherry Long, President of Samena Squares has worked through the updates on non-profit status 501(c)(4). Various communications indicated no requirement to file forms. Evidently the club's various treasurers' addresses were not updated with IRS, and their non-profit status was declined. Someone needs to ANNUALLY file 990-N by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of the fiscal year.

Motion by Larry Long that the Federation engage an IRS enrolled agent. Pat Hoot seconded; **defeated**. Doug Schaefer is willing to assist square dance clubs with non-profit status/filing. Don Pruitt suggested this type of information be given on our website. You can't file ahead of time.









The 67th NSDC Raffle Quilt Story

When Wanda Kruse, prize-winning quilt artist, started quilting, she quickly learned that quilt blocks have names. Many blocks are named from everyday things quilters experienced. For her, these block names evoke stories of strong women and their families.

Cindy Boone, General Chairman, and Wanda share a fascination for the history behind quilt block names. We transformed our interest into this quilt project which features our Kansas and Missouri ancestors who have shaped our lives. The vintage blocks highlight dancing, friendship, and blocks about Missouri and Kansas. Many come from the Kansas City Star archives.

Wanda chose blocks that could be adapted for paper piecing. There are lots of discussions about this technique, and she love the sharp points and block consistency. All appliqué blocks were finished using needle turn. The quilt

was hand quilted in the pattern Wanda knows as "Baptist Fan." The top, batting, and back are all 100% cotton. The quilt size is 101" x 101" so it can be used as a queen comforter or a king quilt.

Quilting is often a solitary project, but dancers throughout Missouri shared their talents. Wanda felt that this quilt was made with the love that you would find in the long ago quilting bees. Everyone who participated in the quilt project is listed on the quilt back.

The quilt was appraised for insurance purposes. It was appraised by a Certified American Quilters Society Appraiser who is highly regarded in the quilting world. The lucky winner will receive a quilt worth \$7,500! Wow, that is a real prize!



Buddy Weaver, San Marcos, California, started calling in 1977 while still in school in Honolulu, Hawaii. He is a third generation square dance caller who joined CALLERLAB in 1981 and has attended 18 CALLERLAB Conventions.

Buddy has called in Japan, Denmark, Sweden, the Netherlands, and Germany as well as in 30 states in the United States. He has also been featured at numerous caller seminars in the U.S. and overseas along with annual presentations on CALLERLAB Convention panels. Buddy is the first American caller to teach and call in post-cold war Poland and the first American caller brought to both Tasmania, Australia and Takagawa, Japan for a square dance festival.

He has been active in square dance recording industry since 1981, with over 300 vocals released. Buddy is the owner/producer of Blue Star and Hi Hat Music. He is Chairman of the CALLERLAB Music Producers Committee and writes a square dance music review/square dance commentary that appears monthly in <u>American Square Dance Magazine</u> and the <u>The Northeast Square Dancer Magazine</u>.

Buddy maintains a strong home program of four weekly class/workshops in Southern California in addition to traveling on weekends and working full-time as a licensed contractor.

Buddy believes in a working collaboration with all callers, and maintaining a positive spirit of building square dancing, thus helping to keep our square dancing activity healthy and strong.




