As of February 4, 2017 report from our registration chair, Bev Mustard, there are 323 registered dancers-up 53 from last report. Thank you to all of you for registering as it helps the committees to take care of business (you know it takes money to put on these festivals and the money is needed up front in many cases and this money comes from registrations!)

The Festival is being held here in Spokane so Spokane Area Council dancers it will NEVER be closer for you to

We know, we know—many dancers who are NOT registered as of this date DO plan to attend so why not just register, get it done, and save some money in the process. This really pertains to all WA State dancers not registered. Cost goes up May 1st.

Here's something to think about—talk to all new class members about the festival and give them a registration form which should be at all club dances. If not, go on the Spokane Area Council website: www.squaredanespokane. org and it click on "Create a Dream in 2017."

By the time you read this, the council treasurers should have received the club renewal instructions for the 2017-2018 dance season. We are following the same procedure as last year. We would ask each council to assist clubs that may have difficulty filling out the on-line form. Councils need to remember, they are also considered a 'club' in the annual club renewal process. Clubs remember, these are club renewals under the direction of your council and returned back to your council.

For your club renewal, the form is on the state web site under the M&I tab labeled **"Club and Council Membership New Club & Renewal Form"**. Click on this form to begin the renewal process. Each line on the form contains specific instructions as to what information should be entered in that field. In order to 'see' this information, all you have to do is put your cursor in that field (do not click in the field, just put your cursor in the field) and leave it for two or three seconds. Lo and Behold!! Information magically appears as to what belongs in that field!


Clubs remember, these are club renewals under the direction of your council and returned back to your council.

We will be emailing out the individual forms, invoices and instructions for the year 2017-2018 directly to every club treasurer in March. Remember, this is the process that requires an updated membership list along with a check for \$6 per member sent directly to us, the Membership and Insurance Chair. We will talk more about this in the next issue.



Different Strokes for Different Folks

We have friends that dance the more advanced Square Dance programs very well, and have a wonderful time dancing. We also have friends that dance the less advanced programs very well, and have a great time dancing. The different programs provide satisfaction to dancers in different ways because dancers have different degrees of interest. The one common fundamental of all the programs is, you guessed it, dancing. Please remember that the measure of accomplishment for any particular dancer is not the 'program' that they dance. The complexity of the moves does not, in and of itself, make you a better dancer. Dance for the pleasure and enjoyment of dancing, and at the level of complexity that meets your enjoyment needs.

A Couple of Half Sashayed, Right Hand Lady Progressions

- From a squared set: all four couples Half Sashay, Heads Square Thru Four; Swing Thru; Girls Run; Ferris Wheel; Centers Pass Thru; Touch a Quarter; Scoot Back; Swing your Right-hand Lady and Promenade.
- From a squared set: Sides Half Sashay; Heads Box the Gnat and Square Thru Four; Swing Thru; Girls Run; Ferris Wheel; Centers Square Thru Three; Swing your Right-hand Lady and Promenade.
- From a squared set; Heads Half Sashay; Sides Touch a Quarter; Center Girls Run; Centers Pass Thru; Swing Thru; Spin the Top; Right and Left Thru (Girl Courtesy Turns Boy); Square Thru Three; Swing your Righthand Lady and Promenade.

If It Hurts Don't Do It

Round Dancing is recreational. We do not normally have competitions except for the kids. Most of us are at an age where our physical problems are catching up with us and it gets increasingly difficult to perform the dance figures with the perfection of youth. When I teach I do my best to teach figures by definition. It is sometimes a challenge because Scott and I also have some problems that make it difficult to show the steps exactly as they should be done. When this is a problem I show the class how it should look by playing the video of the move from Round-a-lab. That being said we have a number of people with knee, hip, shoulder or balance problems that still want to dance for pleasure and exercise. I always tell my students "if it hurts don't do it." I try to work with them to help modify things so they can keep dancing. No one is going to vote you out of the dance hall if things aren't perfect. As long as you keep moving in the correct direction and end up facing the right way with the correct foot free keep dancing. It is far more important to enjoy yourself. That's what dancing is all about.

Computer Printable Patterns

The history of patterns, for the home seamstress, has come along way and is still moving forward. Before 1860 stitchers shared hand traced patterns with their friends and family. They took apart old garments and used them for patterns. In 1860 commercial patterns were just getting started. There were no guidelines on the paper and a very limited amount of instructions. Some of the old patterns are still around, they have mysterious holes in the pieces with notches on the edges. It wasn't until 1919 that McCalls started printing directly on the pattern paper. They printed instruction sheets in tiny fonts with a lot of words and small line drawings.

The future is patterns on the computer, printed on regular desk top printer paper. This has many advantages. One - go pattern shopping at any time without leaving the house. Two - print the pattern and then copy or reprint a spare. Or just keep it in a computer file. Three - copy paper is stronger than pattern tissue. Four - many more patterns choices, from major pattern companies to small independent designers. Five - the pattern companies save money and resources by not printing and distributing patterns that don't sell and are trashed at the end of the season. Six - pattern companies can keep a larger selection of patterns in their catalogs when they are printable.

Printable patterns come with step-by-step instructions, a list of necessary notions, fabric yardage and pattern layout suggestions. Just like the ones from the store. Some of them have on-line videos and a help desk that can be emailed. Invest in file folders, large manila envelopes or plastic bags to store computer generated patterns.

Many of the on-line patterns must be purchased. They usually cost a lot less than the same pattern from a store. Most of the purchased patterns have a restriction on the number of times they can be down loaded, but there is always the copy machine. By looking on line free patterns for almost everything can be found. Even the major pattern companies have some free downloads. Just type 'sewing patterns free' into your search engine.

Charitable organizations, including those who provide support for cancer patients, premature infants and injured veterans, provide free download-able sewing patterns. Specialty patterns are available that include back opening dresses, Velcro closures and side seams - helpful for people whose movements are restricted. Tiny little hospital gowns for infants and projects to help foster children are always appreciated.

There are programs for designing garments on the computer. Wild Ginger (PC) and Cochineal (Mac) are two of the better know brands. Input measurements and select a basic design. From there the possibilities are endless. Change the neckline, redraw the sleeves and add a ruffle. There are some CDs with a number of garments already styled. Input your measurements and get the design you want, that is fit perfectly for you. Heirloom and wardrobe pattern collections, available on CD's, can contain hundreds of patterns.


Computer patterns may be in PDF, JPG, TFF or BITMAP format. Make sure to check the computer system requirements before buying and trying to print a pattern. Many need specific operating software, cookie and ActiveX enabling. Most printable patterns need either Windows or Internet Explorer. These come standard on most personal desktop computers and laptops.

These programs can go through a lot of paper. Check the number of pages that will be printed and make sure the paper drawer is full. This is a great place to recycle paper that has printing on one side. It doesn't matter what is on the back of the pattern.

Printable patterns need to be assembled after printing. Pages are called tiles, each piece of paper contains one section of the pattern. They are taped or glued together, then cut out, like traditional tissue patterns. Assembling the pages is easy, just match the marks on each page. Tracing the assembled pattern pieces on to pattern paper may make them easier to use. The assembly step can be avoided by taking the computer file to a business supply company that prints blueprint sized copies. This service can be expensive.

Once you get accustomed to this new way of thinking of patterns, you will see what fun it is. Greater selection, computer generated just-for-me sizing, and ease of shopping will get you excited about this new generation of sewing.

Getting and Supporting Youth Dancers

Over the past few years I have heard many people say that there is no need to try to get youth to start square dancing since we lose them after high school. I have also had many people ask how to get youth dancers. These are two very different situations that are very closely connected. A major consideration is that if you don't get a youth interested and dancing before they start college, you won't have much chance again until they have graduated. Also, unless we as a community of dancers support a college age dancer there is a very good chance that we will lose them.

Let's address how to get youth dancers first. Your first step is to find some youth who enjoy square dancing. Once you get a few youth, they will bring in more youth. The youth want to have fun and like to dance with other youth. If they can't dance with other youth at least once in a while, they will quit especially if the older dancers refuse to allow them to be "wild and crazy". Set aside an area in your hall for an "adventure" square where dancers are allowed to cut in and out; do circle left/right at a run and other fast/ fun moves. The youth dancer likes a fast paced dance and wants to add in lots of extras in the way of styling and fancy moves. To try to attract youth, contact school PTA's, churches, and local home school associations to try to set up demos/mini lessons with them for family nights. Promote dancing as an inexpensive family activity - this is very true compared to many other activities that families can be involved with. Make sure that youth and families can get to dances - often times they can be unsure of their welcome. Offer to meet them at a dance or pick them up. Treat youth dancers the same as you would the adult dancers - be welcoming to all.

In the situation of "losing youth after high school" this is more of the youth going to college rather than losing interest. Youth are facing three difficulties towards dancing at this time if they are in college: time, finances and a feeling of being abandoned by the dancing community. Time comes first – most college students are full time students which means that they are taking a minimum of 12 credit hours. This is the number of hours they are in a classroom. The colleges

use a formula of 2-3 hours study time at home per credit hour which means a student taking the minimum of 12 hours also has 24-36 hours per week spent in study which equals a total of 26-48 hours per week. If they are taking 15 credit hours this expands to a total possible of 45-60 hours per week. Many students also add in a part-time job to help pay for college which takes another 20+ hours a week. For many of these youth, classes are taken during the day with work arranged around the class schedule – which translates into work in the evenings and weekends. This means that at our normal dance times, the college youth dancer is often at work. If there is a special dance or festival coming up, the college youth dancer can often request the time off of work, but there is no guarantee of them getting off.

Finances are next – college is expensive and getting more so each year. I don't have anyone at a 4-year college yet, but have been informed that students at Oregon State University pay between \$20,000 - \$22,000 per year for their tuition, fees, books, room and board. Other state/ public colleges and universities are close to this range. A private university can double or quadruple this amount. Community Colleges are somewhat cheaper - but it still adds up. I remember 25+ years ago, community colleges had a set fee if you were a full-time student and once you paid that fee, you could take anywhere from 12-19 credit hours for the term. Now the community colleges charge per credit hour. Then you have the class/lab fees, books, additional expenses. Let's look at Chemeketa Community College for an example since I do have students there. A student taking 15 credit hours per term has tuition of \$80 per credit, plus a \$14 "universal" fee per credit equaling a cost of \$94 per credit hour per term. For 15 credit hours, this equals tuition of \$1,410 per term. If the student is taking an on-line course there is a \$50 fee charged in addition to the base tuition. Students are told that they can expect a cost of approximately \$450 per term for books and supplies. So base costs per term can equal up to \$1,860 and when expanded out for a year (3 terms) equals \$5,580. This does not include the parking permit fee of \$40 for the year and other incidental fees such as library/copying on campus or special equipment for certain classes. To pay for this out of pocket, the youth must work at least 20 hours a week for 29 weeks at minimum wage. If a student is living at home, the parents' income is taken into consideration for all financial aide, grants, job share, etc. and it doesn't take much parent income to make a student ineligible for a lot of these. Parental income is used until a student is 25 or 26 years old!

Third, we come to the feeling of abandonment - the college dancer wants to go to dances. When they are unable to do so, they miss the enjoyment, activity, and social community that they have become accustomed to and they miss contact with their dancer friends. If a college youth is working evenings and weekends they may not be able to attend dances due to their work schedule. For example, Thomas' job at Wilco sometimes requires him to work until their 8:00 pm closing time. With dances starting at 7:30 pm, by the time he gets off of work, comes home, and cleans up he can't get to a dance much before they would end, so he doesn't go. If he has a day off and we are going to a dance, he tries to go with us. The dancing community members do talk to the family members of the college dancer - but this isn't the same as personal contact. The college dancer also gets tired of people asking, "Where have you been, I've seen your family". This dancer is in college and working! Please think about getting contact information for the college dancer and send them a quick email or text. They would love to hear from people they have come to know. They would also like to have a quick encouraging word - classes can be very difficult and the students do get discouraged. If a club and extended dancing community has little or no contact with a college dancer for the 2-8 years needed for their degree, why would the college dancer come back?

It is important for all of us to remember – families and youth are who we need to bring into dancing in order to replace those of us who are aging out due to health, age and mobility. If we don't get younger dancers, eventually dancing will die out from a lack of dancers. We need to work to attract and keep them – this does mean an effort on the part of every dancer, not just a few families or a few youth. Make dancing enjoyable at lessons, regular dances, special dances and festivals. The more fun we make it, the more we make it attractive to prospective dancers. Make an effort to establish ties with youth and families – this will make it easier to support these dancers. Please remember when you or your family had youth and what you had to do to support them. Our current youth and families do need the same support – sometimes just a smile and a word of encouragement can mean the difference between keeping or losing a dancer.

Trail-in and Trail-out dances leading into and out of the Festival period are planned. This will be a Mini-Festival, so only square and round dancing are available.

An exciting roster of callers and cuers has been identified so far. You can see who they are, including colour photos, on the Festival's webpage, BCFestival2017.squaredance.bc.ca. Click on the "Callers/Cuers" tab along the top.

Plan to start off with the Trail-In Dance Wednesday night, July 5, in the Recreation Centre at the Festival site, then get ready for 3 straight days of Festival dancing starting at 1:30 pm Thursday July 6. The Trail-Our Dance will take place on Sunday July 9 at the Abbotsford Seniors Activity Association Hall.

It's easy to register online. See the Festival's web page at BCFestival2017.squaredance.bc.ca and scroll down to "Register Now!" You can also download a paper form to complete and mail. Here's a direct link to the registration page: BCFestival2017.weebly.com/register-now.html.

There will be overnight parking for RV's on the rodeo grounds at a cost of \$20/night and only electrical hookups are available. Showers and washrooms are nearby. A shuttle to the dance halls is planned because it's about a 10-minute walk from the parking area to the dance venues. Sign up and pay for RV parking at the time you register. Food and drinks will be available for sale at the Festival site and there are about 20 nearby restaurants.

There are about five hotels and motor-inns within a reasonable drive of the rodeo grounds. Get your accommodation now because, for instance, an online check of the Comfort Inn & Suites, Surrey, reveals that they are fully booked for the Festival dates. Word has it that the hospitality tax rate is expected to be lower in July, decreasing to 12% from 15%. Note that the Holiday Inn & Suites Surrey East-Cloverdale is offering a special discounted rate for Festival participants. It is the only hotel within easy walking distance of the Festival dancing. You must book the special group rate before May 18 in order to qualify. Also, note that Wednesday, July 5 is not officially part of the discounted rate at the hotel but if you plan to stay that night as well, let the hotel know and they'll probably give you the discount anyway. If interested in the special rate, it's important that you contact the general manager or the sales coordinator directly. Don't try to book through the general booking number or normal reservation avenues. Identify that you wish to book under the special Festival 2017 rate. IN MEMORY OF Dexter Sauvé 2/28/1928 - 2/9/2017



Dexter Darlene Sauvé joined her beloved husband in Heaven early Monday morning, February 6, 2017. Dexter was born in Harlan, Iowa on February 28, 1928 to Francis Born and

Orlo Hopkins, the 2nd of four children and part of a very musical family. She moved to Yakima in 1932 and went through public schools here including Yakima High School.

Dexter began singing at a very young age and could be heard weekly performing on KIT Radio as part of a duet with her little sister Nadine. She spent more than seven decades singing and performing with Sweet Adelines and in many Baptist and Catholic Church Choirs, including most recently Holy Family's Resurrection Choir.

During WWII Dexter moved briefly to Seattle and worked for Boeing as a "Bucker" girl, the other half of "Rosie the Riveter's" team. The riveter used a gun to shoot rivets through the metal and fasten it together while the "bucker" used a bucking bar on the other side of the metal to smooth out the rivets. Bucking required a lot of muscle and Dexter was always incredibly strong. She enjoyed being part of the war effort while her childhood sweetheart served aboard the USS Jerauld in the South Pacific.

On August 7, 1945, she married her sweetheart and the love of her life, Charles Shelby Sauvé, while he was home on leave. At the age of 11 she told her dying mother that there was no need to worry about her because she planned to marry that French boy down the street, Charles Sauvé. Theirs was a love so strong that it carried her through her entire life, sharing 56 wonderful years of marriage.

In 1949 Dexter and her husband Chuck took up Square and Round Dancing which became a lifelong passion for the pair. While her husband became a Square Dance Caller they both became teachers for this activity and she was ever ready to provide harmony and backup for his calling. As they raised their family in the 70's the pair taught and called for the Stampeders, a teen square dance group in the Yakima Valley. As the 80's were ushered in Charles became the Caller for the Blue Agate Squares in Ellensburg, WA and Dexter was his ever helpful Girl Friday, always ready to jump in with whatever assistance he needed. The pair became extremely involved in leadership for this activity. They worked on numerous state and national festivals as well as seminars. They held several offices in the Square and Folk Dance Federation of Washington State, including that of President (1988-89). They were absolutely the perfect team and completed each other. Dexter and her husband, Chuck, were honored in 1987 with the "inspirational Cup," better known as the Parker award, for their dedication and tireless efforts in promoting this activity to young and old alike. In 1998 they were again honored, this time with the President's Award for their exceptional service to the furtherance and development of Square and Round Dancing in Washington State.

Dexter's greatest accomplishment has been that of raising not only her own six children but countless others. She cared for her younger siblings when her mother passed early in life and later cared for the children of friends and, of course, her beloved grandchildren. When her older children were young you could find Dexter coaching basketball and softball at St. Paul's Grade School. She was quite the little athlete in her younger days and one of the Mariners' and Seahawks' biggest fans as a little ol' lady.

There was seldom a day without children in her home, she was always baking, care-giving and preparing yummy meals for those she loved and for those in need. Dexter's love language in this world has been acts of service. Our mother was always the first to jump in and help when a friend, family member or stranger was in need. April Fool's Day




